was young and his youthful education was Arias. Young Ryan studied at the Carlow. sem nary and later came to this country, going to St. Louis, where he was appointed a professor in Carondolet seminary. On September 8, 1853, he was ordained a priest by Archbishop Kenrick. In 1858 he was made rector of the St. Louis cathedral and four years later was placed in charge of the church of the Annunciation. In 1872, Father Ryan was consecrated coadjutator bishop of St. Louis, with the right of succession and in 1884 he was appointed archbishop of Philadelphia.

## Life in Philadelphia.

During his twenty-seven years residence in Philadelphia, he was an important figure in the life of the city, participating in many of the public functions held in that time. The university of Pennsylvania gave him the degree of L.L. D. an honor which he had previously received from the university of Missouri.
