M'BRIDE IS OPPOSED TO NARROW ROADWAYS

County Engineer Declares Macadam
Only Nine Feet Wide of
Little Value.

George McBride, county surveyor, cannot
see the wisdom of building the nine-foot
roads which J. H. Maggard of Iowa City,
in an interview yesterday, said were to be
found all over Wisconsin.

"None of our roads are less than twelve
feet wide," said Mr. McBride. "I do not
see how they could consistently be any
less. Why, on a nine-foot road two bug-
les would have trouble in passing. The
tread of most wagons is about five feet.
Therefore on a nine-foot road both wagons
would have to get into the mud. I wonder
what would be done if two loads of
hay met. The ordinary harvester can just
be driven across a sixteen-foot bridge, and
that is all. Even mowers must have lots
of room. I think it will be some time be-
fore Nebraska decides to build nine-foot
roads, even if wider ones do cost more."

NEBRASKA INTO NEXT EXHIBIT

Resources of State Will Get More Ade-
quate Representation.

DAWES COUNTY MAKES A HIT

Chadron Display and Results Ob-
tained by McCorkle Prove Value
of Land Show in Develop-
ment of the West.

Plans for adequate representation of the
agricultural interests of Nebraska in the
next Omaha Land show are being discussed
by the commercial clubs of the interior
towns and the state press generally.

Dawes county alone was represented in
the first show, which closed here January
28. John Cain of Chadron, a Dawes county
rancher, in charge of that display, returned
to spread the gospel of the Land show in
his section. A large number of farmers
and prospective land buyers were inter-
ested in Dawes county by the showing of
high-grade grains and seeds in the Chad-
ron Commercial club display.

Other sections of the state which have
equally meritorious products to put before
the public are to follow the example of
Dawes county in the next Land show.
Thousands of western Nebraska acres
offer opportunity to the farmer in the
same measure as the big development pro-
jects of the farther west. Western Ne-
braska will claim a large share of atten-
tion in the next Land show.

Box Butte county resources were ex-
ploited at the show by J. C. McCorkle,
manager of the Nebraska Land company
of Alliance. At the show he distributed
1,000 booklets on the resources of his county
and as a result interested a large number
of prospective buyers.

Among other counties which expect to
get into the Land show is Cheyenne. This
county has a great area which is capable
of a high efficiency of production under
the proper scientific methods of agricul-
ture. The lessons taught in the educa-
tional programs of the Land show are di-
rectly applicable in this county.

The Wilber Democrat says the farmers
of Nebraska are now taking great interest
in fish since the many planned and exe-
cuted stream improvements, irrigation
ditches and ponds created thereby, and
that is shown by the interest in the Ne-
braska state fisheries exhibit at the Land
show.
