HASTINGS, Neb., March 4 .- (Special Telegram.)-Forty-eight head of horses burned to death in a fire which entirely destroyed Ed Tanner's livery stable early this morning. The fire had gained such headway when discovered it was possible to save only seven animals. Several were badly scorched.

Fifteen vehicles, machinery and feed were destroyed. The loss is about \$16,000 and insurance is \$10,500. The horses were all fine stock, many having been collected for sale today. Several fine saddle and driving horses were among the number.
