FALL OF EASTWOOD IS FATAL

Drops Through Trap Door and Neck is Broken.

COMMITTEE OF 50 STARTS WORK

Temperance People Enter the City Campaign to Work for the Re-election of Mayor Love.

(From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, Neb., March 4.—(Special.)—John Eastwood, a blacksmith, was found dead in the basement of his shop this morning by his wife. He seems to have fallen through a weakened trap door and although the distance was only six feet, he fell in such a way as to dislocate his neck. He is survived by his wife and two daughters. An inquest will be held Monday by Coroner Matthews.

Bentley Charged with Blackmail. William A. Bentley of Lincoln, was indicted for blackmail by the grand jury yesterday. He is accused of having tried to extort money from Walter E. Sanford and failing, sued in justice court. He has a suit now in district court for services rendered.

Broken Bow, Neb., March 4.—(Special.)—As a result of the personal attack made last week on Superintendent R. I. Elliott of the public schools by Loren Cornett, president of the business college, through the columns of the Ocala, the Board of Education today made public the following statement: The Board of Education regrets the publicity that has been and is given to petty jealousies and criticisms of our schools and their management, and in justice to our superintendent we state that at no time has any charge of misrepresentation been made to the board by Mr. Elliott concerning his scholarship or any other matter. Mr. Elliott is a well known and standing at the university and other educational institutions before he was accepted as superintendent and while serving as superintendent we have had full knowledge of his every act pertaining to the school and have now given our unqualified approval.

Seven Killed by Boiler Explosion. LEXINGTON, Ky., March 4.—Three children and a man were killed and six other persons were injured when a boiler at the Isaacburn-Gambill distillery on Howard's creek exploded today. Children were playing about the distillery.

Portland, Ore., March 4.—At Estadai, near here, today a boiler in the lumber mill of the Portland Railway Light and Power company exploded, killing three men and injuring several others.

CASS COUNTY PIONEER GONE. William Murray Dies at His Home in Plattsmouth, Nebraska.

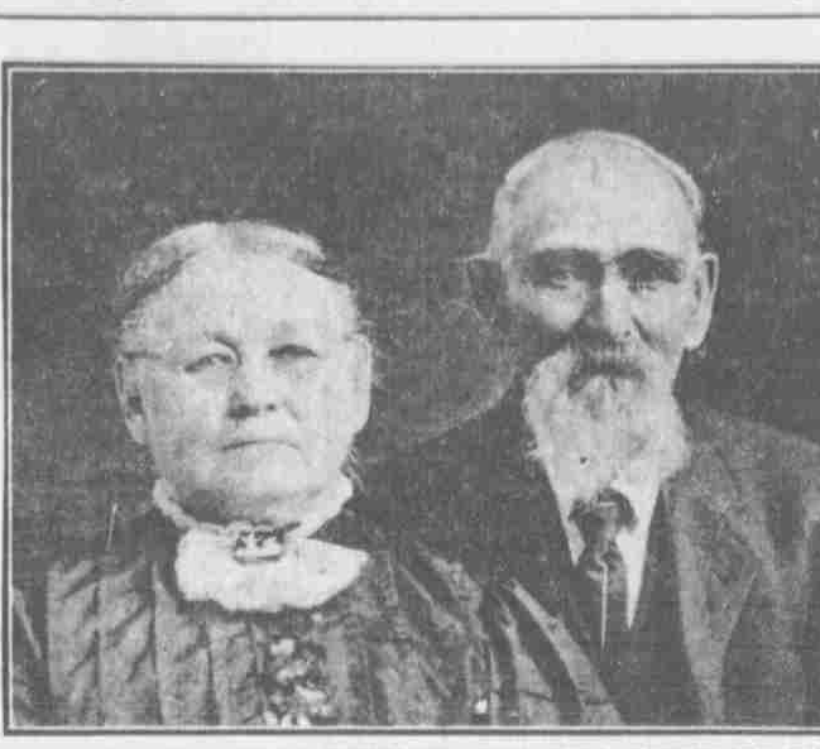

FORTY-EIGHT HORSES BURNED

Ed Tanner's Livery Stable Destroyed Early Saturday Morning.

LOSS, SIXTEEN THOUSAND DOLLARS

Many of the Animals Had Been Collected for Sale to Have Been Held Today—Fifteen Vehicles Burned.

HASTINGS, Neb., March 4.—(Special Telegram.)—Forty-eight head of horses burned to death in a fire which entirely destroyed Ed Tanner's livery stable early this morning. The fire had gained such headway when discovered it was possible to save only seven animals. Several were badly scorched.

Six Persons Burned to Death. CENTER, Tex., March 4.—Six persons were killed in a fire here shortly after midnight. Many others were hurt, at least two of them fatally.

MEMBERS GO TO THE ORPHEUM

Engage 1,000 Seats, Where Governor Aldrich and Wife Will Also Attend as Guests of President Diers.

Reservations are being made at all of the principal hotels by retail merchants from the fifth meeting of the Nebraska Federation of Retailers, March 7, 8 and 9. It is expected fully 800 visitors will be in the city during those three days. Governor C. H. Aldrich and Mrs. Aldrich will arrive in Omaha Wednesday afternoon about 8 o'clock. The governor will speak at 4 o'clock at the Rome hotel. In the evening the state's first oration will be the guest of Fred Diers, president of the federation, at a box party at the Orpheum theater. Other visitors will also attend at this time. Exactly 1,000 seats have been reserved. The theater will be decorated with American flags in honor of the occasion and appropriate music will be furnished.

Warner Confirmed in Open Session. Senate Confers Unusual Honor on Retiring Colleague Appointed to Board of Ordnance.

WASHINGTON, March 4.—Senator William Warner of Missouri, whose term expires today to be appointed by the president today to be a member of the board of ordnance and fortifications. The senate confirmed the nomination. This immediate confirmation of a nomination in open session of the senate is said to be without a parallel since Grant was confirmed as general of the army.

Death Record. BATTLE CREEK, Neb., March 4.—(Special.)—George J. Pratt died at his home in West Battle Creek Thursday. Mr. Pratt was an old soldier, having formerly been a member of the Fourth Illinois cavalry. He was an invalid for many years as the result of injuries received while acting as orderly to General Wallace on the bloody field of Shiloh. Years ago the deceased was stricken with paralysis, since which time he had been unable to assist himself to any degree. Deceased leaves a widow and several children. Interment was held at 2 o'clock Saturday afternoon at the Baptist church under the auspices of John W. Vance pastor, of which deceased was a member.

Frank G. Bigelow Released. Paroled Banker Will Leave for Milwaukee After Brief at Former Mayor's Home.

LEAVENWORTH, Kan., March 4.—Frank G. Bigelow, the Milwaukee banker, who was released from the federal penitentiary here late today. He had served six years of a ten-year sentence. From the penitentiary the paroled ex-banker went to the home of former Mayor M. L. Hocker, where he will remain until tomorrow. He will leave for Milwaukee tomorrow. It is said, Form re Mayor Hocker's wife is a relative of Bigelow's.

Thomas Hires an Attorney. Married for Sixty-Two Years.

IDA GROVE, Ia., March 4.—(Special.)—Mr. and Mrs. Charles W. Moore celebrated their sixty-second wedding anniversary in this city Thursday. Mr. Moore fell and broke his hip last summer and is unable to be about, but otherwise he is in good health and spirits at the age of 85. Charles W. Moore and Hannah E. Condit were married in Wood county, Ohio, March 2, 1848, and came to Marshall county, Iowa, in 1866, going from there to Benton county, and then to Ida county in 1879. This has been their home ever since and thirty years of the time they have lived in the same house. They have three children, Frank P. Moore of Garvin, Minn.; Mrs. Ella Lester of Santa Cruz, Cal., and Mrs. Anna E. Simpson, who lives at home.

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Lumber Rate Case

Comes Up Monday Before Commission

Nebraska Lumber Dealers Are Asking

Reparation from Excessive Rates Charged.

Nebraska lumber dealers, wholesale and retail, are interested in the outcome of the proceedings of the Interstate Commerce Commission before Commissioner Clark at Chicago, March 6, in which the question as to the parties to whom the reparation of 15 cents per 100 pounds on lumber shipments from Texas and the south to Omaha, will be determined. This proceeding is an outgrowth of the complaint of the Commercial club of Omaha against a number of railroads, before the commission for excessive lumber rates from the coast during the last two years. The commission declared that the freight rate of 35 cents was unreasonable to the extent that it exceeded 35 cents per 100 pounds, and directed a report of 14 cents from railroads collecting the excessive rate for the last two years. Under this order of the commission, a large number of lumbermen in Omaha and the state have filed their claims with the commission against the railroads, asking for the commission for excessive lumber rates from the coast during the last two years. The lumber mills of the south have also put in claims for this refund, and are contesting the right of the Nebraska lumber dealers, who paid the freight.

Primary Frauds Charged. Wholesale Cheating in Chicago Alleged in Petition for Recount A by Dunne.

CHICAGO, March 4.—Wholesale primary election frauds are charged in a petition today for Edward F. Dunne, defeated for the democratic majority nomination by Carter H. Harrison. Friends of Judge Dunne are preparing to run him as an independent. The former judge gave out a statement today in which he charges that notorious "crooks" were allowed to act as election officials.
