My advice is to try to discover what kind of a ball the pitcher intends to deliver. Always keep an eye on the catcher when runners are on second or third, because a steal may draw a throw at any moment, and a tided baseman who misses a thrown ball generally lets in a run. Never fail to s cover the base when a runner elides into t and, if possible, keep the runner wide as he rounds the base. Sometimes a slight bump by the baseman will make a runner go out of his path and thereby lose enough ground to be caught at the plate when he tries to score from second on a safe

"I am not an advocate of foul tactics or rough ball, but I think it is legal to hold as much territory as the rules permit and to prevent a base runner from cutting across inside of the bag."
