Shaughnessy and
Pinchot Go to Europe

President of Canadian Pacific An-
nounces that His Road Will Spend
Thirty-Four Millions.

NEW YORK, March 8.—Sir Thomas E. Shaughnessy, president of the Canadian Pacific railway, and Clifford Pinchot, former chief forester of the United States, were fellow passengers today on the steamship Celtic, en route to Europe.

Sir Thomas stated that the Canadian Pacific contemplated spending about \$34,000,000 in the coming year on improvements and extensions to its line, and while in England he expects to place orders for the building of two new ships for the Pacific trade.

Outlines Election
Reforms He Favors

Election Officers Should Pass Exam-
inations and All Candidates Se-
lected at Primaries.

ARMY ORGANIZATION IMPROVED
Officers Who Set Machinery in Motion
Sit Back in Chairs and
Watch Troops Get in
Action.

WASHINGTON, March 8.—The officers who set the machinery going for the great gathering of United States troops and war forms in New Jersey, among the essential features of the bill are these:

That election officers shall pass civil service examinations; the nomination of candidates for office by direct primary is extended to candidates for governor and congressman; all delegates, including those from national conventions, are to be selected in the direct primaries; candidates for the legislature may sign a pledge to support for United States senator those who returned the highest number of votes in the primaries of their respective parties or the one receiving the highest number of votes in the state or refused to accept of the vote of the primaries as binding.

Mr. Bryce's View of
Reciprocity Treaty

High Tariff Wall Between Contig-
uous and Like Countries is
Injury to Both.

LONDON, March 8.—Ambassador Bryce's reports to the Foreign office on the subject of the United States-Canadian reciprocity negotiations were issued in a white paper this evening.

As at present advised, I am disposed to believe that British interests are not to any appreciable extent prejudiced.

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UNION LABEL BILL
SAVED IN SENATE

Members Order it Engraged for
Third Reading After Failing
in Committee.

HOUSE KILLS SIMILAR MEASURE
Measure Will Have Rough Sledding
in Legislature.

SENATE INITIATIVE PAST HOUR
Activity Among Members Indicates
Agreement on Bill.

HOUSE FOR OMAHA CHARTER BILL
Measure Passed by Lower Body

LINCOLN, March 8.—(Special Telegram 5.)—The bill providing that all goods produced near the union label was engraged for third reading by the senate this morning.

Senator Tanner, author of the bill, declared that the senate had raised the standard of the craft, that they were able to furnish better work. Senator Hoagland spoke for the bill as a measure of protection and love between the states of Illinois, Kansas and Hoagland objected to the bill as a discriminating measure. Senator Smith moved to indefinitely postpone, asserting that the bill created a monopoly, as it restricted the printing to those bearing not merely a union label, but a particular kind.

BANDIT SUSPECTS ARE HELD
Two Arrests in Detroit in Connection
with Ogden Holdup.

Both Make Strenuous Denials
Sons of Well-to-Do Men Locked Up
on Telegraphic Request from
the Sheriff of Salt Lake
City.

DETROIT, Mich., March 8.—A Southern Pacific holdup near Ogden, Utah, on the night of January 2 is said to be closely connected with the arrest of Victor (Coke) and Charles (Clare) in Detroit, Mich. The arrests were made by representatives of a private detective agency.

It is declared that Ennes Rouse and Conductor Middleton of the train that was held up were brought to Detroit and that they positively identified the two men who are under arrest as the pair that robbed the train O'Hara is 36 years old and Clark is 37 years old.
