

WESTERN UNION LOANS MONEY

Has Plan Working to Help Its Employees with Funds.

NO SECURITY IS REQUIRED

Money is Secured from Branch Office Direct, as No Special Fund is Set Aside to Care for the Loans.

In order to eliminate the salary loan shark evil, by an order issued from headquarters three months ago, the Western Union Telegraph company, in cases of necessity, now loans to its worthy employees money without interest up to a month's salary. These are honor loans, a note and the payment each month of at least 10 per cent of the employee's salary.

This action was taken by the Western Union company, because it was brought to its attention that many worthy employees were being imposed upon by loan sharks to an extent that in some cases amounted to hardship. One case in particular was called to the attention of the Omaha office. More than a year ago an employee borrowed \$20 of a loan shark. He paid interest on the loan at the rate of \$2 a month until he had paid \$20. The loan shark still held against him the original note of \$20 which if paid would have compelled the employee to pay \$20 for a loan of \$20 in a little more than a year.

Loans from Branch Offices.

Such loans are being made by all of the branch offices of the company. Each loan is handled by the city office. No delay is necessary and action on the application is gotten at once. The necessity of the loan is considered with the worthiness of the employee and an immediate decision given. During the three months this plan has been operative in the Omaha office twenty-four applications for loans have been made by the 260 employees. For many reasons it was necessary to refuse a small number of these. Death, sickness, fire and many other things may enter in making a loan a necessity. In the case of one of the office girls, who applied for a loan to buy an Easter outfit, a loan was refused.

No fund is set aside for the making of these loans, but the money is taken out of the funds of each office.

Nebraska Soldiers Eager for Frontier

Militiamen Anxious and Many Apply for Enlistment—Colonel Baehr is Ready for Call.

In the event that militia officers of the various states are invited to join in the military demonstration along the Rio Grande Lieutenant Colonel W. E. Baehr will be one of the first Nebraska officers to respond. In fact he says he would not wait a minute to slap his equipment together and board the first train for the southwest.

However, he does not regard seriously the dispatch from Washington to the effect that 5,000 militia officers would be invited to join in the movement on the frontier.

"What would they do with all of them?" he declares. "For instance, if one-third that number were to respond there would be a sufficient number to assign 100 to each of the organizations now headed for the border."

"The only plan, it seems to me, would be to invite a certain number of officers from each state, apportioning them according to military strength. In this way the number could be cut down so they could be handled. But, it is absurd to think of 5,000 officers, or even one-third that number, going to the frontier."

Asked what he thought of the possibility of the militia being called out, he declared that the chances are slim, unless hostilities are opened. There is hardly a man in Nebraska who would not go, though, says the colonel. He adds that since the activities of the first two or three days there have been at least 100 applications for admittance into the militia companies here.

Lieutenant Colonel Baehr commands the provisional battalions, composed of four Omaha companies: Company G, Second Nebraska; Company L, First Nebraska; Company I, Second Nebraska, and a company of engineers.

High School Will Hold Two Sessions

SOLDIERS ALL ON THE MOVE

Recruiting Station is Ordered to Get Busy at Once.

LIEUT. SMITH AIDE TO FATHER

Railroads Are Doing Their Best to Hustle the Troops to the Front—Army Posts Are Practically Abandoned.

Additional color to war talk came Thursday in an order received by Lieutenant N. W. Post, U. S. N., in charge of the Omaha naval recruiting station, to redouble efforts to enlist men in the service. Similar orders have been sent to every important naval recruiting station in the country.

Lieutenant Post is one of a number of naval and army officers here who have from the outset looked upon the general movement of troops to the Mexican border as something more serious than a mere maneuver.

"President Diaz of Mexico is on his last legs, and just the moment he gives up the battle of life there is bound to be a general guerilla warfare in that country. American and other interests in Mexico will therefore be endangered, and I think it is a wise move on the part of the United States to send an army in the field to be prepared in case anything serious happens," thus Lieutenant Post sums up the situation.

Though he does not have any official information, he is firmly of the belief that the order for more naval recruits comes as a direct result of the disembarkation of about 60 marines at the United States naval station in Guantanamo, Cuba. Sixteen ships have already put their marines ashore there, making more room for recruits.

"I think the marines have been put off at Guantanamo, because of its close proximity to Mexico," explains the lieutenant. "From that point they can be readily transported to Mexico."

Soldiers on the Way.

In the meantime practically every army troop of the 20,000 ordered to the border has been entrained and is enroute south. Troops A and D, Fourth cavalry, left Fort Meade, S. D., Wednesday evening on two trains, one at 6:10 and the other at 6:40. At Gordon the two trains were merged into one. At 9:40 o'clock the same night the train had reached Lone Pine, a distance of 254 miles from the starting point. This is considered remarkably fast time by the officers of the Department of the Missouri.

Northwestern officials inform the department that the cavalrymen, including headquarters, band and machine gun platoon, besides the two troops, are expected to arrive in Omaha between 5 and 7 o'clock Thursday evening. At this point they will be transferred without delay to the Rock Island and proceed to El Paso. Colonel Stever is in command, accompanied by Major Edgar of the Medical corps.

Word has been received from Washington appointing Lieutenant Raymond Smith as aide on the staff of his father, General Frederick A. Smith, who is on his way south to take command of a brigade. Lieutenant Smith left Omaha Thursday afternoon.

The movements of troops from the Department of the Missouri has left Fort Meade, Mackenzie and Russell practically abandoned. Only a few men and officers remain to guard property, and these are soon to be relieved by civilian caretakers. At Fort Russell, the Second battalion of engineers will take charge, now being enroute from Fort Assiniboine.

THOMAS IS NOT TO ESCAPE

Chairman Black of Civil Service Commission Says Inquiry Will Proceed at Once.

A telegram was received in Omaha this morning from General John C. Black, chairman of the United States civil service commission, which said that District Secretary Morse from Cincinnati would proceed at once with the investigation of the charges against Postmaster Thomas. The commission does not intend to let the case rest and will act promptly to the end that

the local situation be cleared up and the mail service be restored to its proper efficiency.

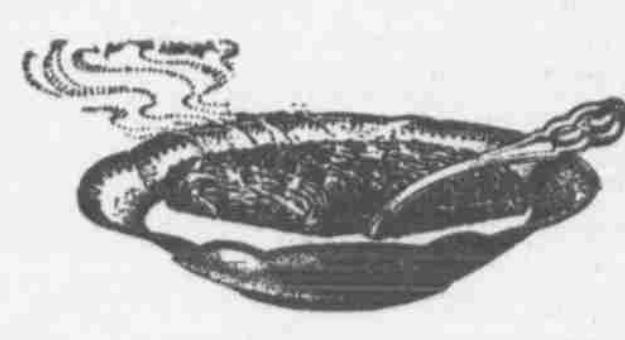
