JAPAN NOT AFTER NAVAL BASE

Baron Uchida Denies Report of Secret Treaty with Mexico.

CHARGE MADE BY INSURGENTS

Diaz is Accused of Seeking Support of the Mikado by Means of Concessions on the Pacific Coast.

WASHINGTON, March 10.—Japan has never made the slightest offer to cede to Mexico any concession for a coaling station for naval vessels on Magdalena bay, or All Saints bay or on any part of the Pacific coast.

This today was the emphatic declaration of Baron Uchida, Japanese ambassador in Washington, when his attention was called to published statements that through secret treaties or other arrangements with President Diaz' government, Japan either had acquired or was about to acquire a coaling station or naval base on this side of the Pacific.

Referring to the fact that a new line of Japanese steamers was to ply between some Mexican ports on the north and part on the south, the ambassador said that if this company has made any arrangements for taking on coal for its vessels in Mexican territory, which naturally would be necessary, of course, such an arrangement was on a purely business basis and was such as is entered into by all commercial lines of navigation.

Reason for Statement.

With such arrangements, he said, the Japanese government had nothing to do or had any attempt been made to extend Japanese sovereignty to any Mexican port where the commercial steamers took on their coal.

The ambassador's statement was directed to a charge by Mexican revolutionaries agents in this country that President Diaz had sought to secure Japanese support by making traffic arrangements with Japanese agents. These arrangements it was alleged would give the Japanese practical control of the Yucatan peninsula, the Yucatan connecting link between the Gulf of Mexico and the Pacific ocean.

Baron Uchida promptly denied knowledge of any special arrangement between his government and the Mexican government relating to the Pacific coast.

Issue of Magdalena Bay.

The conditions under which Magdalena bay was abandoned by the United States navy as a still ground were discussed by officials of the State department when it became known that the arrangement had been interpreted as such in the United States.

HOLLOWELL CASE GOES TO THE SUPREME COURT

Question Whether Member of Omaha Tribe Could Treat Friends to Be Decided.

(From a Staff Correspondent.)

WASHINGTON, March 10.—(Special Telegram.)—Thomas L. Sloan arrived in Washington today to appear before the supreme court in behalf of Simon Hollowell against the United States, which is on the docket and may be reached Monday. This case is brought to the supreme court on certificate of the circuit court of appeals of the eighth district and involves the question of introducing liquor into the Indian country.

Hollowell, who is one of the leading members of the Omaha tribe, invited some friends to his house and gave them liquor. He was arrested and tried in the federal court of Omaha and found guilty. It was selected as a test case and taken to the circuit court of appeals on the proposition whether the federal liquor law of January 20, 1847, was in force in the state of Nebraska over Indian allotments. The Nebraska enabling act, according to Mr. Sloan, has no reference whatever to jurisdiction of Indian lands. The one question left open is that of the introduction of liquor on the Indian reservation.
