DES MOINES, March 11 .- (Special Telegram.)-The lowa supreme court passed judgment of approval today on a contract for rearing a child, involving a romance of the gold rush to the west a half century ago. It was in a suit over possession of property left by E. S. Stiles of Hampton. The successful claimant was a boy, son of a man named Jones, a show maker, who sushed for the western gold fields, leaving two orphan children in the care of three Masonic friends to find a ome for them. Stiles entered into contract with the committee to leave all his property to the boy if he would live with im until he was of age, which he did. Now as a circus man in the west, he secures the property against claimant heirs of Stiles' wife.

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


