

HOMESEAKER TRAVEL HEAVY

Roads to the West Run Special Trains for Three Days.

TOURIST DINING CAR A SUCCESS

Next Big Movement is Scheduled for the First Week in April, When Many Settlers Will Be Looked For.

Further indications of the success attained by the Omaha Land show in bringing settlers to the west were shown Sunday and Monday at the railroad stations in Omaha. A special train was run each day on the Union Pacific, carrying colonists to the coast, and the Burlington carried a special second section on its afternoon train into Montana, Wyoming and Colorado.

On the special train Monday afternoon over the Union Pacific there were four cars carrying colonists who bought their tickets in Omaha and two cars with those who started from Chicago. A smoking coach, a baggage car and a tourist diner were also carried. On the Sunday train five Omaha coaches and two from Chicago were crissed.

The success of the new tourist dining car is even greater than the Union Pacific passenger officials had hoped, and it is almost certain that these will be continued. On the main line to Omaha Sunday afternoon a record was kept and will be kept on all such trains. Twenty-two people ate supper on the diner and they received their meals for a cost of \$14.30. This is an average of \$1.22 apiece.

Meals Are Cheap.—On the record of what each person ordered it is shown that Sunday night the patrons indulged themselves in a number of fairly expensive luxuries, remarked one passenger official. "We believe that a person can live and have good nourishing meals for less than this."

The train leaving Monday night is the last of the special trains over the Union Pacific until April 8, 9, 10 and 11. The homeseekers rush noted each spring on all the western lines is as large as ever, and many of the farmers are coming from points within a few hundred miles of Omaha.

The class of colonists this year is made up of both farming people and city men. Generally they are people of means, and the greater number of them are between 40 and 50 years of age. They are settling all over western points, taking farms from ten acres up to 100, and raising all kinds of crops.

The railroad men of Omaha declare that the real push of settlers after land has not begun as yet, but that it will come the first week of April. Colonists come from the east to the west all of the warmer months, from the first of March until the end of October, and many take up lands in California during the winter months.

Col. Dodd Comes to Take Command Here

Commander of Twelfth Cavalry to Be Head of the Department of the Missouri.

Colonel George A. Dodd, Twelfth Cavalry, is expected here at any time from Fort Robinson to take command of the Department of the Missouri during the absence of General Frederic A. Smith, who is in command of a brigade on the Mexican frontier. The time of his arrival is not known at headquarters, but he is believed to be on his way here.

Colonel Dodd recently returned from the Philippines. He is a native of Pennsylvania, born on July 28, 1852. He was made a cadet at the military academy in July 3, 1872, and four years later, on June 15, 1878, was commissioned second lieutenant of the Third Cavalry.

He was advanced to the rank of first lieutenant on February 25, 1880, and became captain nine years later, August 31, 1889. He attained his majority on February 2, 1901, taking up his duties with the Fourth Cavalry. On March 15, 1903, he was transferred to the Third Cavalry, and on July 28, 1904, he became lieutenant colonel of the Tenth Cavalry. He was transferred to the Fourth Cavalry on November 11, 1907, and on April 14 of the following year he became colonel of the Twelfth Cavalry.

It is reported at headquarters that all of the troops ordered out of the department have left their posts for the south.

URGES TRADE ORGANIZATION

Publisher of Sioux Falls Commercial Organ Argues for His "Fair" List.

"There should be formed in Omaha an organization of manufacturers and jobbers for the specific purpose of looking into the question of what the other fellows are doing and to protect the poor fellow down in the country, who has to compete with all of the many outside business." This was urged by E. J. Mannix, editor of the Commercial News of Sioux Falls, S. D., at a meeting of manufacturers and jobbers Monday.

He declared a "fair" and "unfair" list should be compiled, showing those in the city who were above reproach in their business dealings.

Mannix requested that all of those present who received and read the catalogues of the big mail order houses raise their hands. Only one hand was raised. Mr. Mannix declared it was imperative to know what the "venom" is doing in order best to meet the competition.

Mr. Mannix also spoke a few minutes before the Ben Franklin club.
