VESSEL WILL GO TO PIECES Storm Suddenly Becomes Worse After Twenty-Five Men from Wrecking Crews Board It to Remove Cargo.

WASHINGTON, March 16.-Bixty me are in peril today aboard the stranded British steamer Manchuria, ashore on the Virginia coast, thirty miles south of Cape Henry. The little island life saving station has reported to the 17nited States life saving service here that an intense northwest storm in raging and the vessel is in danger of going to pleces.

The Manoburia sailed from Newport News March 6, bound to Tampico, Mexico, with a cargo of cost. The following day it stranded during thick weather. After a terrible night during which a severe atorm threatened to dash the vessel to pieces, eight of its crew were rescued. The weather moderated and the wreckers went to work to save the steamer. The cargo was being lightered and the wreckers had succeeded in moving the vessel 100 feet seaward.

In addition to the crew of thirty-five there are twenty-five men from the wrecking grews aboard the vessel today.


