Colonel W. F. Cody is Willing to Be One of the First to Represent State.

William F. Cody (Buffalo Bill) would like to be the first United States senator from Arizona, according to word received in Omaha from Tucson. As a statesman he would round out his career as one of the fearless pathfinders of the west. While he declares that he is too busy to think about politics, he does not deny the rumor. Colonel Cody has established a home at Tucson and also a permanent camp in the Santa Catalina mountains. There are more than a dozen buildings in it and he is said to rule like an Arab chieftain.

Army Orders.

(From a Staff Correspondent.) WASHINGTON, March 2.—Special Telegrams.—Army orders. Major William Laessle, inspector general, will proceed to San Antonio to report to the commanding general of the Missouri division for temporary duty. Captain Fred T. Austin, third field artillery, will proceed to Fort Meyer and report to the commanding officer for duty. Second Lieutenant George C. Cook and Second Lieutenant Jacob Frank and Harold E. DeForest, first field artillery, will report to Major Frederick B. Hays, medical corps, for examination to determine their course of promotion. Orders of February 1 detailing Major Elmer A. Dean, medical corps, to the army hospital, Fort Leavenworth, Kan., revoked. Second Lieutenant Walter S. Fulton, twenty-fourth infantry, side-de-camp, now at San Francisco, will proceed to Denver to assume command of the regiment. Brigadier General Robert K. Evans is detailed as commander of militia affairs, vice Brigadier General Erasmus L. Weaver, chief of coast artillery, hereby relieved. Brigadier General Evans and Weaver will report to the chief of staff for duty. Major E. Francis Cheatham, quartermaster, is detailed as member of the commission appointed March 1 to investigate the question of establishing and maintaining maneuver grounds near Chickamauga, Ga. Colonel David S. Stanley, deputy quartermaster general, relieved. By direction of the president, Lieutenant Colonel Charles L. Potter, corps of engineers, is detailed as quartermaster in charge of the fifteenth lightness department, relieving Captain Clark K. Smith, corps of engineers. Lieutenant Colonel Edwin R. Sackett, ordnance department, will proceed to Fort Meade for temporary duty. By direction of the president, Captain Joseph L. Knowlton, quartermaster, is relieved from detail in the quartermaster's department. Captain William K. Bartlett, medical corps, now at San Antonio, will proceed to Fort Oglethorpe for temporary duty upon completion of his duty and will return to San Antonio. Captain Harry S. Purcell, medical corps, now at San Francisco, will report to the commanding officer, general hospital, Presidio of San Francisco, for temporary duty. By direction of the president, orders of Major E. Francis Cheatham, quartermaster, general staff, and Major Ernest Hildebrand, general staff, are revoked. Second Lieutenant C. Perry, first transportation corps, will proceed to Manila, sailing from San Francisco about April 1. Leave of absence for the sixth month is granted Captain Samuel G. Sharple, coast artillery corps.
