How He Met the James Boys.

Of the thousands of reminscences of the days of Jesse James and his brothers, which have been awakened by the death of Mrs. Zeroida Samuela, their mother, an incident in the memory of James A. Gillis is probably the most distinct.

Forty years ago Gillis had just come to Kansas City from his home in the east, and his first position here was as room clerk at the old St. James hotel. On his second night on duty two men rode up to the hotel and registered as Jesse and Frank James. At that time rewards aggregating many thousands of dollars were offered for the capture of the two men, and their reputations had brought them notoriety in all parts of the United States. Gillis, then a young man, was so frightened that he could barely have the men shown to their rooms, but he did muster up enough courage to notify the sheriff that they were in the house.

The sheriff, who had a wholesome regard for the prowess of the brothers, lay in walt for them the next morning, but made no effort to disturb them when they appeared to mount their horses and gallop down Independence avenue. The incident served Gillis as an introduction to the west, and it was many years, he says before he overcame its effect upon him.—Kansas City Journal.

One of the foremost financiers in America, in course of conversation recently, made the following statement, which is likely to cause comment since it is so very different from the pessimistic utterances

"No one of responsibility cares to make predictions, and I am glad I am not called upon to do so. If I were to express my views, however, they would not be pessimistic. The greatest single factor in the whole situation is the coming harvest. If—and this is a big if at this stage—if nature does her duty satisfactorily, and if nothing calamitous now entirely unforeseen occurs in any-part of the world. I think we should have a boom, or perhaps I should rather in any-part of the world, I think we should have a boom, or perhaps I should rather call it a boomlet, before the close of the year. Conditions are tending in that direction. An adverse decision in the supreme court cases would be extremely awkward, but would not permanently affect economic conditions.
