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LONG TRIP TO LOVER'S GRAVE

Miss Olive MacLeod Places Cross on Tomb in Africa.

TRAVELS FIVE THOUSAND MILES

Plans Announced for Visit to India of the King and Queen of Great Britain, by Way of Egypt.

LONDON, March 18.—(Special to The Bee.)—That the mighty journey to place a cross on the grave of her late sweetheart, who was murdered while on a like mission to the grave of his brother in the wilds of Africa, has taken Miss Olive MacLeod nearly 4,000 miles into a land which never before was visited by a white woman. The grave sought by Miss MacLeod was that of Lieutenant Herd Alexander, the explorer, slain in Central Africa in May of 1892. In a letter received in London she describes her journey, which was made through great difficulties.

Plans for Royal Journey.

The plans for the journey of King George and Queen Mary to India next November have been announced. The royal party will traverse overland to a Mediterranean port in the vicinity of the railway cars. A stop will be made at Port Said before the voyage through the canal. Here the fleet of the king, with the British general present, will meet the king, and probably proceed with him as far as Aden. A stop will probably be made at Aden for the purpose of dealing with state business over the cables. Lord Crewe, who will be with the party, will organize a complete system of communication, in the form of wireless telegraphy, which will be a prominent part. The party will include a complete literary man, to whom will be entrusted the task of preparing an official account of the tour to be published immediately on the return.

Wesleyan Ship for Honolulu.

Miss MacLeod who is the daughter of the late Mrs. MacLeod, late permanent under-secretary for Honolulu, determined to make a pilgrimage to Lake Chad. She started on her journey in August and landed at the mouth of the Nile. For 1,000 miles she was borne in a litter by native boys and finally reached Malindi without mishap.

Should Women Ride Astride?

Western ideas and customs are finding their way into staid old London, and the question "Should women ride astride?" is being asked in the social set. Already a number of fair equine enthusiasts have adopted the custom of riding astride in Rotten Row and it appears that the fashion is making rapid headway in the riding schools, especially among very young girls.

Several society women are doing their best to introduce the fad. For several years past Viscountess Eastleigh has regularly ridden astride in the Row and other distinguished "astriders" are the duchess of Westminster, Lady Constance Stewart-Richardson and Hon. Mrs. Fairbairn.

Montenegro's Royal Invalid.

One of the most interesting invalids of the moment is the king of Montenegro. He is the most paternal ruler in Europe and judges his little kingdom on the traditional methods of the east under the palm tree. Law does not trouble him, and when he has made up his mind what the offender deserves the offender gets it there and then, without any regard to the case with which he may have kept within the letter of the law. Of all monarchs there is none more unconventional than the king of Montenegro.
