New Books

Fiction.

THE UNKNOWN LADY, by Justus Miles Forman; 361 pp.; \$1.50. Harper & Brothers. The searcher after the "unknown lady" is Henry Trent, who even as a small boy had mysterious experiences, and out of the vast unknown there comes to him a little girl with gray eyes, with whom he talks and plays. He becomes an artist in order to paint her portrait, and in a single winter paints five pictures which he shows to his friends.

THE END OF A SONG, by Jeannette Drake; 209 pp.; \$1.15. Houghton Mifflin company. This is a simple tale of simple folk, told with humor and pathos. Like Miss Mark's other book the scene is laid in Wales, and the life and customs of the little country are charmingly portrayed.

LOVE BEREAVED, by Charles E. Pearce; 227 pp.; \$1.25. A. C. McClurg & Co. The story is laid in the time of the Indian mutiny, and is built around the defense of the residency of Lucknow. Mystery and romance are in every chapter, and among the characters depicted is a native, who is thought by historians to have been the guiding genius of the mutiny.

THE ROGUE'S HEIRERS, by Tom Gallon; 318 pp.; \$1.50. G. W. Dillingham company. The characters in this story are well drawn, and the hero, when self-involved in a mesh of crime, performs an act of unselfish altruism by the rescue of a defenseless girl from a plot to gang hold her for her fortune which he and a gang of scoundrels had devised against her.

THE TRAIL OF A TENDERFOOT, by Stephen Chalmers; 234 pp.; \$1.15. Outing Publishing company. The book abounds in genuine humor, and the author leads us far, but the pace never tires us. Now we are after deer in the Adirondack forests; now we are taking pot shots at the seal on Campobello Island; now we are after pollock with a "tin rod and a wheel" (as the old fisherman disdainfully put it) up in Passamaquoddy bay, and again we are on the palmy beaches of the Spanish Main.

THE GOLD BAG, by Carolyn Wells; 313 pp.; \$1.50. J. E. Lippincott company. This story deals with a murder mystery, and is told in the first person by a young detective, who, despite his own astuteness, finds it necessary to call on that past master of deduction, Fleming Stone, a character which has figured in other detective stories by Miss Wells.

KEEPING UP WITH LIZZIE, by Irving Bacheller; 124 pp.; H. Harper & Brothers. This is a jolly little story somewhat different in tone from the longer novels Mr. Bacheller has given us, but nonetheless acceptable.

Miscellaneous. **AN INTERPRETATION OF GENESIS**, by Rev. P. P. Ramsey, Ph. D.; 356 pp.; \$2. The Neale Publishing company. Many books have been written on the origin and authorship of Genesis and the Pentateuch, some ascribing to it ante-Mosaic origin, some post-Mosaic, but Dr. Ramsey declares it to be Mosaic. "The whole historical and geographical coloring is too thoroughly consistent with the times and places of Moses to permit any serious doubt of its origin from Moses."
