STEWART FILES HIS BRIEF

Evidence Produced in Abduction Case Dissected.

PANGBURN AND YARWOOD SCORED

Complete Analysis of Testimony in Justice Cooper's Court Made to Prove Case of Miss Ruth Stewart.

SUIT AGAINST DOCTOR OVER EFFECT OF X-RAYS

Charles A. Horner Declares He Was Injured to Extent of \$10,000 by Treatment.

The original notice of a suit for \$10,000 was filed in the district court yesterday afternoon by Charles A. Horner, a former Council Bluffs policeman. The defendant is Dr. J. H. Cole, and the heavy claim for damages is based upon the allegation that the careless use of an X-ray machine injured Horner to the extent of making him suffer severely for many months, necessitating skin-grafting in the effort to repair the burns caused by the rays.

Attorney General of Iowa Pays Visit to Council Bluffs in These Suits.

Attorney General Cosson arrived in Council Bluffs at noon yesterday and for several hours during the afternoon was closeted with County Attorney Capell in reference to the prosecution of the reinstated indictments. Afterwards he held a lengthy secret conference with W. H. Kilpatrick, attorney for the Board of County Supervisors, who passed the resolution instructing the county attorney to dismiss all of the Mabray indictments.
The attorney general will remain in Council Bluffs all of today and tomorrow. He is here for the purpose of making a careful examination and determining what course to pursue to remove the stain from the name of the city and the state caused by the operations of the Mabray gang of swindlers.

Iowa Supreme Court Interprets Moon Law; Saloons Are Hard Hit

Holds Law Went Into Effect When Signed, Forcing Many Men Out of Business.

DES MOINES, Ia., April 19.—Because of a decision handed down by the supreme court of Iowa, scores of saloons in the state will have to go out of business.
The law in question is known as the Moon law, which prohibits more than one saloon for each 1,000 of the population in each town or city.

SAINTS ASSIGN MINISTERS

Conference at Lamoni, Ia., Apportioned Work for the Year.

FINAL SESSION HELD MONDAY

Address of Reverend President of the Church is Feature of the Closing Meeting—Tears and Smiles.

LAMONI, Ia., April 19.—(Special.)—The world's general conference of the Reorganized Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints, which has been in session here since April 4, adjourned Monday after the reading of the appointments of the various missionaries.

The closing of the morning business session was the address of the venerable president of the church, who spoke extemporaneously and for nearly an hour, covering a great many phases of church work and venturing a prediction that death would make few inroads on the officers of the church this year.
