Madero Signs First.

General Madero was the first to sign the armistice. He placed it in the hands of Oscar Braniff and Toribio Equivel Ohregron, who rode on their mission to Juarez. General Navarro then signed an identical letter with which the messengers returned to the rebel camp. Braniff is a wealthy citizen of Mexico City and an amateur sportsman and aviator. Ohregron is a leading lawyer there.

The peace meeting began in the rear of an adobe house on the banks of the Rio Grande across from the smelter on the American side. Crowds of sightseers had crossed from the American side and a guard was thrown around the house and its meager, dusty grounds, to protect the conferees.

Along the river for a mile the soldiers sathered, confronting a long row of curious persons on the other side of the stream which at this season is shallow and in many places not more than fifteen feet wide.

The soldiers for the most part were cooling their feet and hands in the water, or giving much needed attention to their Their wiry, stunted ponies, the very backbone of guerilla warfare, searched the hillside vainly for grass, orw aded knee deep in the brown waters of the stream. Many of the sightseers had brought lunches, portions of which, with peanuts, oranges and the like, they tossed across to the insurrectos, who laughingly schambled for tidbits to which they have been for so long strangers.
