Four Railroads Entering Cleveland Charged with Rebating and Violating Elkins measure.

Penalty for Rebuting Fine of Not More Than Twenty Thousand, with Imprisonment Not Over Two Years.

CLEVELAND, O., April 28.-Ten indictents on 107 counts charging four iron ore carrying railroads entering Cleveland with rebating and alleging two of them guilty of conspiracy to violate the Elkins law, were returned by the federal grand jury here today. Several indictments of individuals also were returned.

The railroads are the Pennsylvania, the Lake Shore & Michigan Southern, the Bessemer & Lake Erie and the Chicago, New York, Chicago & St. Louis (Nickel Plate). United States District Attorney Day anounced tonight that the three officials indicted are Dan R. Hanna, presiden, and R. L. Ireland, second vice president of the M. A. Hanna company, Cleveland, and D. T. McCabe of Pittsburg, fourth vice presi dent of the Pennsylvania railroad.
