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KENYON DRAFTS TRUST BILL

New Iowa Senator Ready with Sherman Law Changes,

WILL AWAIT TRUST DECISIONS

Believes Public Will Not Appreciate Any Wenkening of This Regulatory Act-Sloan Introduces Tariff Bills.

(From a Siaff Correspondent.) WASHINGTON, April 29. (Special Telegram) Secutor W. R. Kenyon of lowawill introduce a bill for the modification of the Shorman anti-trust law. Senator Kenyon is now engaged in drafting it, but has not announced the terms of the measure. It is his intention to seek to make the law more specific and more stringent than at present. He hopes to have the penalties made more severe, both with repect to jail sentences and to fines.

It is the opinion of Benator Kenyon that the American people will never consent to the emasculation of the Sherman law. He believes the public demand is to have the law made stronger, instead of weaker. As assistant to the attorney general, in charge of anti-trust cases for the government, Mr. Kenyon acquired knowledge of the workings of the Sherman law. His. first speech in the senate will probably be on this subject.

Senator Kenyon will probably defer the introduction of this bill until the supreme court has handed down the tobacco and oil decisions. He expects, however, that these will not be long delayed.
