ROURKES LOSE; UMP MOBBED

Patrid Decisions of Kneeland Make Him Fair Mark.

KING AND ANDERSON FINED

Two Players Laid Off for Handling Out Fanishment to Unpopular Official—Four Game of Ball Presented.

Fifteen hits off Kneeland and the able assistance of Umpire Kneeland gave the champs the third and last game of the series by a 13 to 4 score. Kneeland was the whole show at the game and was the recipient of two well delivered blows on the jaw, two dozen lemons, eggs and cushions for rotten decisions, and was escorted from the grounds by three bluecoats.

It all began in the fourth inning, when Kneeland had landed safely on first after a hit. Anderson came to bat and sent the ball to deep center, going all around the circuit and sliding for the post. He had crossed the plate with half his body when he was tagged by Miller and Kneeland called him out. Anderson jumped to his feet and struck the ump. on the jaw. Kneeland attempted to defend himself and King rushed from the bench and landed another hook on the same spot.

Anderson was the first to get into the game of the two enraged men stopped what would have been a grand battle. King and Anderson were both sent from the field and fined \$10 with a three-day layoff.

Kneeland's Work Poor.

Kneeland got in the work across of the fans on Monday, when he made a couple of poor decisions which worked better worse during the week and the fans and Omaha players were getting worked up to a fighting point. All through the game the umpire was jeered at by the fans, but his decision in the fourth capped the climax and bedlam broke loose. For a while it looked as if the bleacher crowd would pour out to a fighting point.

In the beginning of the ninth inning, Kneeland made a poor decision at second base and was showered with two dozen lemons from the bleachers. Cookies and eggs also rained down upon him while he was kept in the middle throughout the entire last inning. Immediately after the game he made a rush for the grandstand and attempted to make his getaway, but he was assaulted with cushions, stale eggs and the like.

One fan, with indignation written all over his face, rushed up to the handler of the indicator and was about to swing on him when the police interfered.

Officers escorted Kneeland out of the stands and into a waiting automobile, in which he was conveyed to his hotel. During the disturbance in the grandstand some one telephoned the police headquarters for more policemen and by the time the umpire was out of the way a large part of the police force was at the park.

Game is Uninteresting.

Except for the umpire the game was uninteresting. Omaha got ten hits and made eight errors, while the Champs made five more hits and only made two errors. Kneeland pitched good ball until the eighth inning, when five hits and two errors gave the Champs six runs. Had Anderson's run counted in the fourth inning, the score would have been tied.

The Rourke left last night for a trip around the circuit and will be gone for eighteen days, the longest trip to be made by any team during the season. Fifteen games will be played while away and a good line on the team will be had by that time. Denver, St. Joseph, Lincoln, Topeka and Wichita will be played by the Rourke while on the trip.

St. Joseph City opened its first inning with four runs. Andreas drew a pass and took third on Kane's wild throw to third, and came home when Agnew threw poorly to first to catch Stiem, who was hit by Hartman landed safely on first on Kane's error. Champs Garner Hits.

Six runs were batted in by the Champs in the eighth. Andreas singled to left and stole second, but was caught stealing third. Stiem singled past third. Hartman took first on a fielder's choice. Neighbors singled to right and scored with Hartman on Wagner's triple. Wagner scored when St. Joseph's pitcher, R. Kelly, pitched to second, stole third and scored on Breen's sacrifice fly to Durbin.
