Kansas led in the first three quarters and the fourth man went off thirty feet in advance of Reed, the Nebraska captain. Reed caught him about fifteen yards from the end and finished about five feet to the good.

Nebraska then upset the dope by taking two points in the final event, the high Jump, which was expected to go to Kansas. Kansas took first, but two Nebraska men and a Kanzan tied for second.
