Yates, Sov-Clerk, soon became actively engaged in the duties of his office.

Twenty-one years of effort has resulted in enlisting nearly 600,000 members; establishing two ladies' auxilliaries and promoting co-ordinate jurisdictions in Canada and the Pacific States, making a combined membership of over 800,000 men and women in the system of perfected woodcraft
