ABBATEMAGGIO, THE INFORMER, IS UNABLE TO APPEAR AT TRIAL WHEREIN HE CHARGES MURDER OF CUOCOLO AND WIFE.

VITERO, May 8.—Genera Abbate Maggio, the informer, who has experienced a trying ordeal in confronting for several days those whom he accused as principals in the murder of Genera Cuocolo and his wife, is unable to appear when the trial of the Camerists was resumed today.

In his absence the morning session was taken up with reading of the opinions of medical experts who examined the bodies of the murdered men.

The expert found forty-seven wounds on the body of Cuocolo and thirteen on that of his wife.

Abbate Maggio testified that the greater number of the knife wounds were inflicted by Corrado Sortino.

Sortino's clothing need not necessarily have been covered with blood, and that he might have gone from the scenes of the assassinations by train without attracting particular attention.
