border points carried women and children out of Cananea in the opinion of a rebel attack upon that camp. Associated Press correspondent who made the six-mile journey by motor car from Naco to Cananea last night found the citizens of Cananea calm and the large number of Americans there preparing for any eventualities. The men refused to utilize the automobile to make their way to the border, leaving the vehicles for the women and children.

Juan Cabral demanded the surrender of Cananea at 2:30 p. m. yesterday. The federal garrison consisting of 200 men under Major Arnold, and 200 under Colonel Chiquita, refused to surrender. Cabral then sent a courier to American Consul George Wiswial, advising that the Americans in the camp be removed to a place of safety.

The rebel leader expressed solicitation for the safe removal of the women and children and said that he would grant them for their safe removal. An appeal immediately was sent to the American border towns for automobiles, the railroad having been destroyed between Cananea and Naco, as well as the line from Del Rio to Nogales.

The first of these automobiles reached Cananea at 9 o'clock and before midnight more than a score had arrived, most of them starting on the return journey at once. No excitement attended the exodus, the women appearing to enjoy the adventure.

Last night negotiations were begun to prevent a battle. Major Arnold headed a Canadian contingent sent to the rebel camp under a flag of truce for a conference with Cabral, which lasted until midnight.

Bert Pritchard of McCook County Covers Route on Motorcycle in Less Than Two Hours.

SIoux FALLS, S. D., May 13.—(Special.)—Quite a number of the rural mail carriers in South Dakota have recently equipped themselves with motorcycles, and are now engaged in a discussion as to which has the honor of covering his route in the shortest possible time.

Bert Pritchard, a rural carrier on a route in McCook county, presents strong claims that he is the speediest rural mail carrier in the state or northwest. Like the other claimants for the speed record, he makes his journeys on a motorcycle. His route is twenty-five miles, he delivering mail to sixty-four patrons, and he presents figures to show that he covers his route each day and delivers mail to the number of patrons stated in the remarkably brief time of one hour and fifty minutes.
