Strong Demand for Securities Immediate Result of Oil Decision. INTERPRETED AS BULLISH FACTOR Stock Advance With Rash, Important Issues Gaining From Two to Four Points—Demand More Than Local.

Wheat Opens Strong on Cables and Bullish Report. DOMESTIC NEWS FAVORS BEARS General Selling on Range Makes Profits—Corn Trade Feels Sure of Big Movement Rest of the Month.

OMAHA, May 16, 1911. Cables were firm, and some higher, causing a strong opening, coupled with bullish reports and a general feeling of confidence.
