Extensive Profit Taking Sales Characterize Day's Operations.

NO CHANGE IN THE SENTIMENT

United States Steel Again Leads Market in Activity, with Interest Undiminished-Copper Group is Strong.

NEW YORK, May 18.—Extensive profit taking sales today characterized the advance in stocks. The buying lacked the enthusiasm of the two preceding days and his at midday trading felt off. Professional traders were ranged on the selling side. The tone was hesitating during the latter part of the day and the market fell back from its high point, although prices were reduced by only small fractions.

The change in tone was due to technical conditions rather than to any reversal of sentiment. Union Pacific had advanced hearly seven points from its close of Monday to its high price of today. United States Steel gained nearly five points and Reading four points.

Speculative interest in United States Steel was undiminished and it again led the market in activity. Other steel stocks were strong. Bethlehem Steel scored a good advance and Colorado Fuel was one of the strongest issues.
