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"RITUAL MURDER" CHARGED. Massacre of Jews Threatened Following Finding of Boy's Body. REPORTS ARE NOT AUTHENTIC. Even Anti-Jewish Newspapers Admit That Reports on Which Agitation is Based Are Not Worthy of Credence.

ST. PETERSBURG, May 18.—The serious situation which has arisen through the threatened massacre of Jews at Kiev, following the finding of the body of a boy under circumstances as to raise the cry of a "ritual murder" has aroused the authorities in their endeavors to solve the mystery of the Jew's death.

On Wednesday afternoon, May 18, will commence the annual session of the Nebraska yearly meeting of Friends, Nebraska, Colorado and part of South Dakota. The college being located at Central City and perhaps the largest congregation of Friends in this jurisdiction residing here, the annual council, known as the yearly meeting, is held here.

Another feature of the session will be the dedication of Herd's hall, the \$12,000 agricultural building on the college campus toward which the late T. B. Herd donated \$5,000. The sessions of the yearly meeting begin on the 21st, and will continue well over into the next week.

Stephen L. Myrick, of Greenboro, N. C., who has been elected president of Nebraska Central college, succeeds Stacey J. McCracken, who resigned a few months ago on account of his wife's health demanding that they reside in Colorado.

Since then Prof. McCracken has been doing field work for the college and Rev. John Hadley, pastor of the Friends' church here has been acting president.

ST. PETERSBURG, May 18.—The American Jewish committee, when asked by the Associated Press today for its version respecting the recent dispatches from Kiev, authorized the following statement: "The committee is satisfied that only a wide publicity can avert a recurrence of the horrible massacres instigated by the Russian government which took place between 1904 and 1906, especially at Kishineff, Odessa and Bialystok, when thousands of Jews were foully massacred and millions of property destroyed."

"The monstrous and infamous stories recently sent out by the Russian government from St. Petersburg, Kiev and Moscow and published in American newspapers, respecting the alleged murder of a boy at Kiev, are perfectly similar to the unfounded tales circulated by the Russian government previous to the Kishineff, Odessa and Bialystok programs."

"Investigation shows that the stories which have been sent out to American newspapers are founded upon baseless calumnies which appeared several weeks ago in Germany and Austria. One hundred and twenty cases have been investigated in Germany during the last half century. All yielded negative results."

M. Shostberg said that in the present case—the killing of the boy Yushchinsky—no information was available. The investigation has yielded no results or the results were not ready for publication. All that could be said was that no Jew has yet been arrested or was implicated.

It was suspected, when the body was found in a cave near a Jewish quarter, that the Jewish sect, Hassidim, which is alleged to forbid the burial of ritualistic victims, may have had some knowledge of the case. With respect to the Hassidim, M. Shostberg said that the Jews of Russia are divided into two classes, the Hassidim, meaning pious, and the Mesnakhim, meaning opponents. The two exist side by side. Adherence to either sect depends upon the temperament of individuals or communities.

The Hassidim are mystically inclined and acknowledge spiritual leaders called Zadyk. The Mesnakhim formalists are strictly disciplined. They deny the intermediary spiritual functions of the rabbi. The use of blood is equally abhorrent to both denominations. Committee Makes Statement.
