HINES ATTACKS NEWSPAPERS

President of Lumber Association Makes Annual Address.

HE DENIES ALL CHARGES

Says President Taft's Reciprocity Agreement is an Injust Discrimination Against Lumber Industry.

CHICAGO, May 24.—Edward Hines, named before the Helm legislative committee in connection with the collection of an alleged \$100,000 fund to elect United States Senator William Lorimer, today took occasion before reading his annual address to the National Lumber Manufacturers' association, of which he is president, to defend his acts and to flay his accusers.

Following an all-night session of the board of governors of the National Lumber Manufacturers' association adopted a resolution expressing confidence in President Hines which was adopted by the association immediately after the president's address.

In his address Mr. Hines said in part: "I deem it proper at the outset to say a word respecting certain charges that have been made against me, and in some instances against the lumber interests in relation to national affairs.

"I absolutely deny these charges. I am absolutely innocent of any wrongful acts in these matters. I have no apology to make for my conduct as an individual or as an officer of the association, or any other association which has honored me with its confidence, nor have you or any other factor of the lumber industry any apology to make for its conduct and attitude toward national affairs.

"So far as I personally am concerned, at the proper time and by the proper procedure I shall vindicate myself and confound my traducers before a tribunal that will be a grotesque travesty on law and justice—a mere tool of politics and the subservient organ of unfair and unscrupulous journalism.

"I shall not only welcome, but I shall insist on and secure the fullest investigation as to my action in a tribunal that will be the sanction of the law will bring out the truth and expose the falsehood.

"Attacks Newspapers and Taft. "What I have done in behalf of the lumber industry in my own and in your behalf, and what you have done in co-operation with me, has been done openly and legitimately."

Plunging into his annual address, after a brief opening, President Taft's reciprocity plan, saying: "A year ago at the New Orleans meeting I congratulated you on what I thought was a satisfactory ending of the tariff campaign, yet now we find ourselves again in a renewed campaign of the same sort."

The defense showed it was impossible to get witnesses into court at this time.

NEW BUILDINGS AT ABERDEEN

Passenger Station, High School and Harvester Office Will Cost Four Hundred Thousand Dollars.

ABERDEEN, S. D., May 24.—(Special.)—Plans have been decided upon for the new Milwaukee station which will replace the one burned several months ago. The new structure will occupy an entire block. The cost will be in the neighborhood of \$200,000 and it will be one of the handsome passenger stations between Chicago and the Pacific coast termini of the road. Work will be started soon on an \$50,000 building for the International Harvester company's headquarters at Aberdeen and the new \$125,000 high school building will be completed in time for the opening of school next fall. These three buildings representing a cost of nearly \$375,000.

STORY OF LYNCHING A FAKE

Mayor of Bluefields, W. Va., Says There Never Has Been Any Mob Violence in City.

BLUEFIELDS, W. Va., May 24.—Indignant at the publication in certain papers of an absolutely "faked" story that a man had been lynched to a church cross here several days ago, Mayor Stowers and Chief of Police Postlethwaite today issued the following statement: "The publication purporting to be an account of a lynching of a man by hanging to the spine of a church is made out of the whole cloth. There has been no fatal shooting here in six years and never in the history of the city has there been a mob."

STORK IS HUNNY BIRD.

GREAT BRITAIN BEFORE AMERICA

Dinner of Pilgrims' Society in London in Honor of Colonial Premier Noteworthy for Plain Speaking.

LONDON, May 24.—The dinner of the Pilgrims' society tonight in honor of the colonial premier was historic, because of the unexpected and noteworthy plain speaking by Sir Wilfrid Laurier, the premier of Canada. Sir Wilfrid, addressing an audience composed of many of the great men of England, handled the annexation question without gloves.

His speech by expressing amazement that during his three days' stay in England he had heard so many people of standing voicing doubts concerning the designs of the United States regarding Canada. He scoffed at the idea of annexation being seriously considered on either side of the border.

"Canada in sharing the continent with the United States, he said, had a double interest in the treaty of arbitration between the United States and the United Kingdom and he exclaimed dramatically: "I thank God that the relations between the two peoples never were so good as they are today."

The dinner was in contrast to the one held at a former imperialistic conference, because that was of purely British imperialistic tone, while Anglo-American relations were almost the sole topic tonight. Lord Roberts presided and welcomed the premier. Sir Edward Grey, the foreign secretary, proposed "Anglo-American arbitration," without adding anything significant to his former utterances on this subject.

CITIES TO BLAME FOR FIRES

W. L. Fisher, Secretary of Interior, Makes First Official Speech.

BUILDING REGULATIONS ARE POOR

Better Codes and Better Enforcement of Those Already Enacted Are Needed—Government Setting Good Example.

NEW YORK, May 24.—Walter L. Fisher, the new secretary of the Interior, delivered his first official speech here today at the meeting of the National Fire Protective association. Secretary Fisher's subject was "Fire Waste and Its Remedy."

He declared that the national government was trying to reduce this loss by requiring fireproof material in the construction of its buildings and making experiments to ascertain the best material to use. Neglect of these precautions, he said, was mainly the fault of municipalities. Government statistics, he asserted, showed that the annual fire loss was one-half the value of the new buildings erected during the year.

"If the government," said Secretary Fisher, "should suddenly lay an annual tax of \$50 on every man, woman and child in the United States on a promise of spending the money for some useful purpose, it would not avail against the storm of protest which would be aroused. Nevertheless a tax which is levied on the aggregate amounts to that, it is levied on the people of this country, it is the annual fire loss of the nation upon buildings and their contents alone. Not only is the property loss paid by our people, but in addition, annually 1,500 persons give up their lives and nearly 6,000 are injured in fires. In no other civilized country are conditions so bad."

NORRIS ON ROOT AMENDMENT

Publishers' Agent Says It is Intended to Prevent Clause from Becoming Operative.

WASHINGTON, May 24.—John Norris, representing the American Newspaper Publishers' association, was again before the senate finance committee in advocacy of the Canadian reciprocity bill today. Mr. Norris declared that the Root amendment to the bill providing that the paper clause of the measure should not be in force until the president proclaims that wool, wood pulp and paper are admitted free all parts of Canada free of duty, would postpone indefinitely the date of application of the treaty.
