Most Wheat Traders Are Changing to the Bull Side. LITTLE CORN FROM COUNTRY

OMAHA, May 26, 1911. The majority of conservative traders in the wheat market have been consistently bearish for some time past on the ground that the weather and crop news has been very favorable. The situation has suddenly changed and the majority are now taking a bullish position.

Wheat was strong and higher on the opening, but eased back to yesterday's close. Receipts were 20,000 bushels against shipments of 20,000 bushels.

Primary corn receipts were 70,000 bushels and shipments were 60,000 bushels. Clearances were 4,000 bushels of corn, 600 bushels of oats and wheat and flour equal to 40,000 bushels.

NEW YORK STOCKS AND BONDS

Underlying Strength of Market Leads to Advance. SUPPLY OF STOCKS IS SMALL

NEW YORK, May 26.—The underlying strength of the market, which has been apparent through the week in spite of the unusually severe pressure that was exerted to advance in prices today when the pressure was relaxed.
