MICHAEL FITZGERALD KILLED WHEN CAR HITS AMBULANCE. Aged Driver of County Vehicle Sustains Fracture of Skull on Farnam Street.

The county hospital ambulance, driven by Michael Fitzgerald, collided with a Farnam street car at Thirty-eighth avenue at 3:45 o'clock yesterday afternoon. Fitzgerald, aged 42, was driving north when he struck the car, killing him on the spot.

Fitzgerald was driving north on Thirty-eighth avenue. The car, in charge of Mortimer Floyd Cockrell and F. L. Hodgson, conductor, was proceeding south. The ambulance was upset, throwing Fitzgerald to the pavement. He sustained a fracture of the skull, together with other injuries. Police Surgeon T. T. Harris and Dr. Shramke attended the man and ordered him sent to St. Joseph's hospital.

Mr. Fitzgerald leaves two daughters, Agnes Fitzgerald and Mrs. James Burke, who lives at his home, 219 A street, South Omaha.

DEAVER'S PLAN IS ENDORSED. Government Official Says He Likes the Grubstake Plan of Taking Homesteads.

T. V. Powderley, chief of the division of the bureau of immigration and naturalization, has sent a letter to D. Clem Deaver of Omaha, colonization agent of the Burlington, endorsing Deaver's plan for the grubstake homestead law.

The grubstake law provides that two men may take a homestead in partnership. One must be a citizen of the United States and the other must be a citizen of some foreign country.
