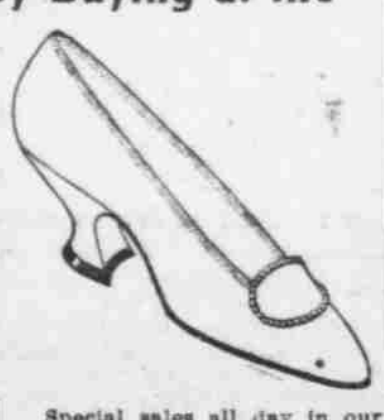

FIRST TO MAKE A PHOTOGRAPH

Centenary of Dr. John W. Draper, the Man Who Made It.

BIRTHPLACE OF THE TELEGRAPH

A Collaborer of Morse in Developing the Transmission of Sound—How the First Picture Was Taken.

In the old building of the New York university on Washington square, the birthplace of the telegraph of Morse, there was taken in 1839 the first photograph of the human face. The photograph was that of Miss Dorothy Catherine Draper, the man who took it was her brother, Dr. John William Draper, professor of chemistry in the University. He had gone a step beyond Daguerre and by this photograph established himself as one of the great inventors of the nineteenth century.

Friday, May 8, was the hundredth anniversary of Dr. Draper's birth and it was celebrated in the auditorium of the university at Aqueduct avenue and One Hundred and Eighty-first street, New York. The exercises were only preliminary to those expected to come later when a committee recently appointed by the university works out a plan for some fitting memorial of Dr. Draper.

It was on the roof of the old building on Washington place that there was set up in 1839 the first photographic gallery in the

world. To this gallery there came to be amazed and delighted all the notables of the day, including Theodor Frothingham, the candidate for vice president on the Henry Clay ticket.

Prof. Draper took the pictures. His camera was a cigar box and his lens the glass from a pair of spectacles. Dr. Draper's assistant in this gallery, the man who posed the sitters and attended to the artistic details, was Prof. S. F. B. Morse. He only five years before and in the same building had operated the first telegraph line.

Improving on Daguerre.

The pictures taken in this gallery were developed by Prof. Draper, for it was his experiments in regard to the chemical action of light that had led him to improve the process of Daguerre almost as soon as the latter's discovery was made known. It was in 1839 that Daguerre gave his process to the world, but it was not then adaptable to landscapes or portraits.

In the same year Prof. Draper announced that he had found the way to photograph the human face and to overcome those obstacles which made the Frenchman's process imperfect and impractical.

In these kodak days the directions which Dr. Draper gave at this time for taking a photograph are interesting. At first, he said, he had tried dusting the face of a sitter with white powder, but he later found that this was unnecessary. On a bright day and with a sensitive plate, he announced, portraits could be obtained in the course of five or seven minutes.

"The hands of the sitter," he said in these directions to the camera stands of that day,

"should never rest upon the chest, for the motion of respiration disturbs them so much as to make them of a thick and clumsy appearance. Destroying also the representation of the veins on the back, which, if they are held motionless, are copied with surprising beauty."

"A person in a black coat and open waistcoat of the same color must put on a temporary front of drab or flesh color or by the time that his face and the fine shadows of his wooden clothing are evolved his shirt will be soiled and will be blue and black with a white hair around it."

"Owing to the circumstances that yellow and yellowish browns require a long time to impress the substance of the daguerotypes, persons whose faces are freckled all over give rise to the most ludicrous results, a white portrait mottled with just as many black dots as the sitter has yellow ones."

On March 25, 1840, Dr. Draper took from the roof of the building the first photograph ever taken of the moon. His plate was exposed twenty minutes and the image was about an inch in diameter. The photograph was presented to what was then the Lyceum of Natural History. It created a great sensation at the time, not only here but abroad. Daguerre's name was given to the photographic process for many years after this.

Exhibit of Rival Pictures.

While Dr. Draper and Prof. Morse were busy with their daguerotypes, Daguerre sent to this country M. Francis Gouraud to make his invention generally known. While in New York he learned the process of portrait making from Dr.

Draper. Among Gouraud's directions was this:

"The person, if a man, must be dressed in a clear gray coat; pantaloons of a little deeper hue; a vest of a fancy ground—yellow, orange. If possible—with figures of a color to make a contrast; the whiteness of the shirt contrasting with a cravat of a gray ground either a little less dark or more deep than the coat. The toilet of the lady should be of the same shades, and in all cases black must be constantly avoided, as well as green and red."

Gouraud put an exhibition a large number of daguerotypes made by Daguerre himself. They attracted a great deal of attention among the residents of New York City and vicinity, eliciting great praise from all.

The newspapers and journals of the time joined in the general praise and gave long accounts of the pictures and the process of making them, in reply to demands of readers. Washington Irving's magazine, the Knickerbocker, had this to say as part of a two-page article:

"We have seen the views taken in Paris by the 'Daguerotypes,' and have no hesitation in avowing that they are the most remarkable objects of curiosity and admiration in the arts that we ever beheld. Their exquisite perfection almost transcends the bounds of sober belief. Let us endeavor to carry to the reader an impression of their character. Let him suppose himself standing in the middle of Broadway, with a looking glass held perpendicularly in his hand, in which is reflected the street, with all that therein is, for two or three miles, taking in the harshest distance. Then let him take the glass into the house, and find the impression of the entire view, in the softest light and shade, vividly retained upon his retina. This is the daguerotype."

World Leaders.

American daguerotypes were acknowledged to be the world's leaders. At the world's fair in Paris, 1851, when they numbered over 10,000, the daguerotypes of this country took the first prize with a remarkable exhibition. In England, France and Germany the superiority of the American daguerotypes was acknowledged by advertisements of "the American process."

The best daguerotype in London was an American, Mayal, and in Paris the same held true with Thompson.

The price of daguerotypes varied from \$2.50 to \$15, according to the size and case. There was no extra charge for wax to keep the wing-shaped ears from standing out or for wads of cotton called "plumpers," to fill out hollow cheeks. The reduction of this time of exposure to a minute or so helped to decrease the cost. The ordinary size of a daguerotype was two and three-quarters inches to three inches, and it cost from \$2 to \$5. The largest size was thirteen inches by fourteen, while the smallest was made for a pocket.

Achievements in Chemistry.

The man whom Dr. Draper honored as the first photographer and a great chemist was born an Englishman. He came to this country at the age of 21, graduated from the University of Pennsylvania in 1826 and was appointed professor of natural philosophy, chemistry and physiology at Hampden-Sydney college in Virginia. It was from there that he was called in 1829 to be professor of chemistry at New York university, and he signalled his change of residence by announcing at

most immediately thereafter his photographic process. He was connected with the university until his death in 1882.

Dr. Draper has frequently been described as a pioneer in the science of photography. His discoveries in this field covered a wide range. He even anticipated the mesodent light of Edison when he suggested as a standard for photography for white light a piece of platinum foil of given area and thickness heated to incandescence by an electric current of specified strength.

Capillary attraction was the subject of his first researches and from them arose his discovery as to how the blood is purified—a mystery which had baffled the scientists up to that time. It was in 1847 that he explained the circulation and purification of the blood in a work that attracted wide attention—New York Sun.

London Standard and Le Journal has a total prize list of \$88,920, and this sum will probably be further increased from other cities and towns on the route of the circuit. The chief winner may qualify for \$25,000 and the runners-up will also be well rewarded. The Petit Journal of Paris that from Paris to Rome, which starts the latter part of this month, will be worth \$60,000, while the overcast circuit—Calais-Dover-Poikstone-Boulogne—offers \$60,000 as an inducement to aviators.

In the 1,000-mile race around Great Britain, starting July 22 at Brooklands, \$20,000 has been guaranteed and the other big events are: Circuit in Saxony, \$47,900; Aix-Bainles meeting, \$45,000; German tour, finishing at Berlin, \$60,000; French Aero, finishing across the Mediterranean sea, \$20,000; Automobile Club of France (Grand Prix d'Aviation), \$20,000; and Le Petit Parisien, Paris to Madrid, \$12,000. The total amount of prize money to be offered in connection with the flight for the international champagne trophy, now held by Claude Grahame-White, has not yet been announced, but as England is very keen on aviation at present, it is probable that at least \$50,000 will be offered in prizes.

There are at least a dozen events for which sums varying from \$4,000 to \$20,000 have been announced, while \$50,000 will be hung up at meetings and tours under arrangement in Germany, Italy, France, Russia and Belgium—New York Times.
