The American record is 17 minutes, 45 seconds, by Daniels in a bath of sixty-five turns, but with the same number of turns which Longworth took, Daniels did 19 minutes 30 seconds on Verona lake two years ago. The English record in a bath of eleven turns is 17 minutes, 58 seconds by S. Battersby two years ago.

In the 100 yards Cecil Healy just managed to beat the youngster by a touch, and Healy was considered lucky, for Longworth had something taken out of him in a trial heat of another event. In a short time afterward Longworth showed wonderful sprinting ability, though the "hundred" may not be his very best distance. For all journeys above the century mark he exhibits rare speed, as can be shown by his world's record for the 110 metres. He swam the distance in 65 seconds, wiping all the old marks off the books. Davis Cup. NEW YORK, June 3 .- Again, early in the eason, the prospects of there being international tennis matches for the Davis cup are dwindling. From an official note from London received in this country it appears that South Africa, which challenged as a nation for the first time, is likely to default. England, or, as the cup conditions put it, the British Isles, is finding it difficult to secure players willing to journey to Australia.
