Net Gain of 621 is shown in Membership Over Year Ago.

VISITORS INDULGE IN BANQUET

Sessions Will Continue Throughout Wednesday and Thursday—All Officers of Nebraska Grand Lodge Present.

The annual communication of the Grand Lodge, Ancient, Free and Accepted Masons, of Nebraska, convened at Free Masons hall Tuesday morning with about 300 delegates from all parts of the state present. Harry A. Cheney, grand master, delivered his address immediately after the opening of the session.

All officers of the Grand lodge were present with the exception of Michael Dowling, acting grand treasurer, who is expected to arrive Wednesday morning. The morning was taken up following the grand master's address, by routine business, which was continued throughout the afternoon. At 8 o'clock Tuesday night the annual oration will be delivered by Elmer W. Brown, grand orator.

Immediately following the morning session a dinner was served to the masters and wardens and delegates in the lodge banquet hall, at which over 300 plates were laid. Wednesday morning the annual election of officers will be held.

A reception committee of fifty Omaha Masons is in charge of the entertainment of the delegates and the securing of suitable hotel accommodations. The grand lodge will remain in session over Wednesday and Thursday.

The annual report of the returns committee shows a net gain in the membership roll from April 1, 1910, to March 31, 1911, of 621. The number of Master Masons in 1910 was 17,886, while in 1911 the number was 18,507. The total gross increase in membership was 1,569 and the total loss 948.
