WORLD'S WHEAT POSITION HEAVY

Forecast for Unsettled Weather and Showers Over Corn Belt Did Not Materialise-Temperatures Favorable.

PROBING THE LUMBER TRUST

Hearing Continues in Suit on Tries at Kansas City.

SECRETARY GORSUCH A WITNESS Admits that He Gave Notice of Reciprocal Arrangements Have ing Been Agreed

Upon.

KANSAS CITY, June 15.-The bearing of the state's quo warranto suit against the alleged lumber trust before Commissioner R. M. Reynolds was resumed here today. Harry A. Gorsuch, secretary of the Southwestern Lamber association, was again a witness, making the third day he has been on the stand.

Attorney General Atkinson asked him if) he had attended a meeting of the joint trades committee of the National Lumbermen's association and the Southern Lumbermen's association in Chicago in 1904, at which certain rules affecting the lumber trade has been promulgated. The witness said he attended the meeting.

"Did you send out a report to the members of your association in January, 1906, announcing that certain reciprocal arrangements agreed on at the meeting of the joint trades committee in Chicago in 1904 had been abrogated?" "I believe I did."

Row Over Bulletin.

A long argument was precipitated by the attempt of the state to introduce in evidence a bulletin sent out by Bierd Critchfield, secretary, to the members of the Nebraska Lumber Dealers' association n 1906. This pamplet contained the rules promulgated at the meeting of the je trades committee in Chicago in 1904.

"You are familiar with these rules, are you not?" the witness was asked. "No. I cannot remember them clearly. They were never put into effect and were

abrogated soon after they were promulgated," was the reply. At this point W. C. Scarrett protested against the introduction of the bulletin as evidence. He said several witnesses had testified that the rules laid down by the joint trades committee had never been in effect and that the so-called rules were

not arbitrary, but merely recommendations to the various lumber associations, Judge J. B. Gantt, for the state, said that the testimony given at St. Louis showed that the rules were effective for a time in this state and that they violated the anti-trust laws of Missourt. "The witnesses at this hearing are up
