SEVENTEEN TRIES LEAVE SCORE TIE

Darkness Comes on and Umpire Calls Lincoln-Omaha Game in Seventeenth Inning.

BULLETIN STANDS TWO TO TWO Omaha Had Game Tucked Away Until the Eighth Inning.

KNEAVES MAKES COSTLY ERROR His Botchery Helps Lincolnites to Chalk Up Two Runs.

PITCHERS PERFORM STEADILY However, It Was Fine Game, Filled with Startling Stunts, Fine Catches, Circus Plays and Much Noise.

For seventeen innings Omaha and Lincoln battled evenly, and then darkness came on with the score locked at 2 to 2. It was a game filled with startling stunts, sensational catches, circus stunts and much noise. Even J. Pluvius had a hand in the game, stopping the play for a while after the eighth inning.

Robinson, the new pitcher, acquired from Toledo, made his debut before Omaha fans, and before the game was ended he was heralded as the coming terror to all Western league batters. Wolverton, who was on the firing line for the Antelopes, was there also and pitched a game equally as good as his opponent.

After the fatal eighth no more runs were made. Both pitchers settled down to the game and used every possible twist on the roter to mystify the batter. Strange to say, as the game progressed the more bewildering were the wrinkles which whirled across the pan. In the fourteenth inning, when it seemed that something should happen, Robinson struck out three men in a row.
