NEW YORK, June 20.—Stocks gave way slowly totally to a comparatively small amount of selling. The market was unusually dull. A lew stocks, such as Great Northern preferred, Canadian Pacific, Denver & Rio Grande, the Eries, International Harvester and the electric and telephone shares lost a point or more, while Northolk and Western and some less active issues exhibited considerable strength. The present uncertainty as to crop prospects is largely responishe for this position.

Hitwever, the list exhibited considerable underlying strength as was indicated by its steadmess in the face of a decline of nearly 4 points late in the day by American Telephone. SILVER WEDDING HOLDS EYES Reception on White House Lawny Ends Most Notable Function.

FIVE THOUSAND ARE PRESENT Mrs. Taft Surprises Her Friends by

> Remaining by the President's Side in Receiving Line All Evening. WASHINGTON, June 20.-The silver wedding celebration of President and Mrs. Taft, the second that has been held in the White House, came to an end last night

with the reception on the White House lawn. Invitations had been sent to almost 12,000 persons and while the official count of those who shook hands with the president was not given out it was estimated that at least 5,000 persons were present. Never in the history of the nation probably has such a function been held in Washington. The diplomatic corps, the United States supreme court, the senate and the house of representatives, the de-partments of the government, the men who are high in political affairs of the country, the army and navy and almost every walk in life were represented. The clear, cool night, making the reception in the open air possible, prevented the crush of which the White House for days has been afraid and made the reception not only brilliant and unusual, but delightful in every respect. The guests would have filled the White House to overflowing, but the White House grounds are ample and there was no

crush and no confusion, Possibly 15,000 people crowded about the iron fence that surrounds the grounds and looked longingly at the electric display, the splashing fountain and the gay throng within. Washington seldom gets excited about sweething, but tonight it showed Its interest in the anniversary of the president in unmistakable fashion.

The eards said that the reception would begin at 9 o'clock and promptly on the hour, to the strains of the wedding march, the president and Mrs. Taft walked slowly preceded by the six presidential aides and followed by the cabinet. Out through the red room to the rear portico of the mansion, down the broad steps and out onto the lawn the procession marched, while hundreds of guests already in the grounds watched their progress. They took their stand beneath two trees just about the center of the lawn, whose branches were joined by an electric sign flashing

The guests entered from the east front. passed through the corridors beneath the White House and out opto the lawn. Down the winding walk they passed in two lines to where the president, his face wreathed in smiles, was waiting to meet them all-Above the walks the electricians had touched the trees with magic and they, blazed in red and white and blue bulbs From the top of the treasury a monater searchlight played upon a new American flag upon the summit of the mansion. Over the rear portico another flag in red, white and blue incandescent lamps, shimmered and waved. The fountain in the center of the grounds, played upon by another searchlight, sprinkled forth all hues of the rainbow.

The Washington monument, 1,000 feet to the south, brought into sight by the thousands of lights, stood out sharply against the sky, with here and there a star striving unsuccessfully against the lights of

Presents Beautiful Scene. The White House sawn, clipped and shaved to the very quick, made a carpet of soft dark green over which walked lightly the gayly clad women, the men in black or in the white of the military s in scarlet coats played with vigor and in the White House itself the Engineer band vied with them. Every corner of the man-

sion had its own particular light. On the terraces that extend upon the old mansion eastward and westward the beauty of the White House conservatories had been poured. The tall lamps that stand along the borders of these terraces had been shaded by deep red paper, resembling nothing so much as monster popples. The reception was just as informal as the president could make it. Those who

could waited in line for hours to shake hands, but many slipped out of the lines and sought the shaded walks, the chairs waiting on the grass or wandered at will through the lower floors of the mansion. The presents that numbered in the hundreds and whose money value ran high into the thousands attracted many, whileothers turned to the east room, whose polished floor echoed to the tread of the dancers.

Preparations had been made for 5.000 guests and the refreshment tables in the state dining room came as near groaning as a perfectly good table can come. The president and the members of his family with the cabinet and the aides were served on the east terrace but the guests found their refreshments in the tate dining room.

Mrs. Taft Stays in Line. Mrs. Taft surprised even those familiar with the improvement in health that she has shown by remaining by the president's side in the receiving line all the evening. She wore a gown of white satin brocaded with white flowers, with a court train. Miss Helen Taft, who was near at hand, wore a gown of pink satin with a tunic of pink chiffon.

In spite of the unusual crowd the machinery had been so perfected that every-Totals28,000 74,100 47,000 thing worked smoothly. The automobiles under the watchful eye of the police, chugged up to the east entrance. deposited their occupants and steamed away again a half dozen to the minute. The foot passengers found access more difficult but the police arrangements were good and with a ittle rushing now and then, a little diplomacy here and there, they got through the crowds of the curious. More than 100 policemen in uniform were on guard around the fence and the usual plain siothes men and secret service guards were within the grounds.

While 9 o'clock had been named as the hour at which the reception began no time was fixed for the end of the festivities and it was after midnight that the engineer band struck up "Home, Sweet Home," the ast dancers swept out on the floor of the east room and the president felt that he could retire.

The president said in part: "The prospect of going back to a less ctive life has in it at this time some phases that are welcome and some that are unwelcome. The necessity for labor which will follow my retirement, however, relieves me somewhat from anxiety on that score.

"It will be now, when my son Robert comes back to practice law, four generations in Cincinnati, and while it has been pressed on him and on me to have him go to some place where possibly his emoluments would be larger, I am determined, and he sympathizes with me, that he shall go to the home that knew his great-grandfather and his grandfather and his father, and there he shall work out his life under the influences that I hope will he favorable to his success at least in restraining him within the path and the limitations of an honorable life."
