Neighbors of Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Holder Rescue Infant-Parents May Be Prosecuted.

ABERDEEN, S. D., June 21-Special.)-The town is aroused over a cause of cructy to an infant, and the parents who are alleged to have mistreated their child will be arrested. About il o'clock they returned from the arnival, and Holder became very indignant at the neighbors' action, and threatened violence because they had interfered in his domestic affairs. The Helders will be prosecuted for their neglect of the child, which has been placed in proper hands
