Cables Support Wheat and Prices Work Upward.

HOT SPELL HELPS CORN PRICES

In Liverpool Wheat Moves Up and Corn Down—Market Everywhere is Given Good Support.

OMAHA, June 26, 1911.

The wheat market got so good support from cables that the Northwest and wheat market worked up from Saturday closing level. The market shows great confidence in prevailing prices.

Wheat ruled stronger and values were higher. Shorts were nervous and covered on the advance. Cash wheat was unchanged to 1/4¢ higher.

Corn ruled higher with wheat and reports of damage in the extreme southwest started new buying. Cash prices were 1/4¢ higher.

Primary wheat receipts were 54,000 bushels and shipments were 21,000 bushels. Against receipts last year of 87,000 bushels and shipments of 191,000 bushels.

Clearances were 10,000 bushels of corn, 80,000 bushels of oats and wheat and flour of 65,000 bushels.

Prime Minister of Australia Says Large Land Owners Bene.

DO INJURY TO COMMONWEALTH

Refuses Degrees at Oxford and Cambridge—Lord Rosebery Declares Englishman's Home No Longer His Castle.

LONDON, June 26.—Andrew Fisher, who left Scotland, where he worked as a pit boy, to seek employment in the mines of Australia, and who is now back as prime minister of the commonwealth, was shocking the English by his outspokenness and his support of ideas which here are considered almost anarchistic.

Mr. Fisher's reply was: "You don't know what you are talking about," and then he proceeded to show how, in his mind, the large land owner retarded the progress of the country by tying up his land and holding it for speculation.

Mr. Fisher has thus far declined all titles and degrees offered him. He did not accept one at Oxford, which was to confer a degree upon him in common with other prime ministers, and he declined a degree offered him by Cambridge.

Lord Rosebery has exploded the idea that an "Englishman's house is his castle." The former minister has discovered that in the finance act of last year, which provided for the valuation of land, there is a clause which permits a valuer to enter any house and inspect it at will.

Lord Rosebery, accepting the privilege of every Englishman, wrote to the press a letter of protest, concluding thus: "There is thus a definite end of the proud boast of centuries that an Englishman's house is his castle. We all remember Chatham's boast: 'The poorest man may in his cottage bid defiance to all the forces of the crown; and so forth. I warn all off this recitation, for it is now a mockery and a deception. We are a tamer race now.'"

KILLS OFFICER AND WOUNDS POLICE CHIEF

Pipe Moulder at Anniston, Ala., Becomes Crazy When Police Seek to Arrest Him.

ANNISTON, Ala., June 26.—Policeman John L. Cunningham is dead. Police Chief Nathan Glasgow is seriously wounded. Officer James Glasswood is shot through the wrist and W. S. McGuffin, a pipe moulder, charged with having killed the officer and wounding the two officers, is in a local hospital riddled with small arms fired by an unidentified man in the posse that caught him.

McGuffin, it is said, was resisting arrest on a charge of intoxication. The town is excited and numerous threats of lynching prompted McGuffin to move to the county jail from the hospital. It is not believed he is fatally wounded, though shot in many places.

STANLEY HOTEL BLOWN UP BY GAS EXPLOSION. HALF MILLION DOLLAR STRUCTURE IN ESTATES PARK IS WRECKED AND EIGHT HURT.

ESTES PARK, Colo., June 26.—The Stanley hotel, built at a cost of \$500,000, was partially wrecked tonight by an explosion of acetylene gas. Eight persons were injured, one seriously.

None of the guests was injured. A hotel employe was buried from the second to the first floor and both ankles were broken. The other seven injured are negro waiters. The explosion wrecked the west wing of the hotel.

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
