Statistics of Great Inter-Collegiate Regatta

POUGHKEEPSIE, June 26.—One hundred and twelve oarsmen, representing five American universities, and divided into four crews, will engage tomorrow afternoon in the great annual regatta of the Intercollegiate Rowing Association, composed of Columbia, Cornell, Pennsylvania, Syracuse and Wisconsin.

The regatta will be held on the Hudson river on what is known as the Poughkeepsie course, a straight, deep stretch of water beginning three miles north of the Poughkeepsie bridge and finishing one mile south of the same structure.

The program, comprising three races, is as follows: FIRST RACE. 4 P. M.—University four-oared shells without coxswain; two miles, beginning one mile north of the bridge and finishing one mile south of the bridge.

Second Race. 4:30 P. M.—Freshman eight-oared shells; two miles, same course as first race.

Third Race. 5:30 P. M.—University eight-oared shells, four miles, over full course.
