

WASHINGTON, June 28.-The United States treasury will have a surplus of apmen to cover and they intend to do all their proximately \$25,000,000 when the fiscal year work in one day. of 1911 ends on Saturday. The fiscal year of

1910 closed with a surplus of \$15,0.0,000. This year's showing will be the best since when a surplus seldom equalied-\$111,000,000-was shown. Both 1908 and 1909 showed deficits of \$20,000,000 and \$58,000,000. respectively.

Total receipts from all sources are expected to total approximately \$687,00,000. They were estimated at \$578,000,000. Total expenditures, not including the Panama canal, will be about \$660,000,000. The treas-Charles Martin, who acted as best man, ury expected to spend \$602,000,000. The year's work on the canal will cost approximately \$40,000,000. All of this was advanced out of the government's ready cash and will be replaced from the proceeds of the \$50,000,000 bond sale which will begin to flow into the treasury about July 18.

Corporation tax receipts which were being depended upon to contribute largely to a surplus probably will not be received as promptly as was expected. Treasury officials expect that fully \$15,000,000, or half the estimated receipts from the tax, will not be forthcoming until July 10.




