New Books

JOHN SHERWOOD, IRONMASTER. By Dr. E. W. Mitchell. 318 Pp. \$1.25. The Century Company.

John Sherwood is a master of men, he is also a slave of his own iron will and never lagging energy of mind. His growth from starved and struggling youth to the position of master in a great industry, his first bitter defeat when the tired body can no longer resist the inroads of disease, and he realizes he must give up the fight he loves to battle for his life is portrayed. But, of course, Sherwood does not die, and the story of how he seeks health in the Maine woods, his gradually changing outlook on life, and finally how, with the advent of "the one woman," he plucks supreme happiness from the heart of tragedy, constitute the main threads.

A CAPTAIN OF RALEIGH'S. By G. Theodore Roberts. 223 Pp. \$1.25. G. C. Page & Co.

A typical Roberts romance—dashing and brisk with the scenes for the most part laid in the infant colony of Newfoundland, at the time when Sir Walter Raleigh and other famous captains swept the seas for England. Sir Walter is one of the characters in the romance, but the chief interest centers about one of his officers, Captain John Percy. Elizabeth Duwasey, the heroine, is beautiful and vivacious enough to quite turn the heads of the several gallant gentlemen who struggle for her hand, and to keep the reader guessing until the very last page as to which suitor will find favor in her eyes.

THE EARLY HISTORY OF JACOB STAHL. By J. D. Beresford. 323 Pp. \$1.25. Little, Brown & Co.

The author deals with the youth of a man, who despite physical weakness and the mistakes of early life, possesses moral strength, and he gives a strong portrayal of his character development as affected by the influence of others for good and for evil. Jacob Stahl's loves, his friendships, his efforts to obtain a business foothold, are set forth in detail. His is the story of one who rises by experience and learns to face the future optimistically when life looks darkest.

THURLEY RUXTON. By Philip Verrill Mitchell. 278 Pp. \$1.25. Desmond Fitzgerald, Inc.

At the beginning of the story Thurley Ruxton is nobody in particular. Just a young woman who teaches languages for a livelihood and has golden hair, brown eyes, a lovely face and a magnetic personality. A series of happenings lands her in a palatial home on Fifth avenue as the friend and companion of a woman who has her own purposes to further. She is generally believed to be a German princess who is hiding in America incognito. And thereby comes about such a succession of complications as keeps the reader's heart in his mouth until Thurley Ruxton finally enters safely upon the fairy land that her cleverness and her stoutness of heart have won for her.

THE SPIRIT OF THE ISLAND. By Joseph Honor Coates. 373 Pp. \$1.25. Little, Brown & Co.

The author has selected an island of Marib's vineyard for the setting of the story, and successfully casts over the reader the spell of its picturesque beauties. To the island comes a man suffering from ill health, grieving over a great sorrow, and absorbed in his own wretchedness. The heroine, around which the incidents revolve, symbolizes in her own personality the spirit of the island, its quietness and tenderness and charm, the soothing influence of its gray, mossy nature, the invigoration of the winds that sweep its uplands, the song of the sea dashing against its cliffs.

MISS GIBBIE GAULT. By Kate Laney Foster. 228 Pp. \$1.25. Harper & Bros.

In this book the author continues the story of Mary Cary and old Yorkburg, though Mary is no longer autobiographical, and Miss Gibbie, a rich and eccentric old maid, comes to the fire with her. Miss Gibbie has had a bitter romance in her youth, and her heart seems closed until Mary's sweet and sunny nature causes it again to blossom as it was meant to do. Miss Gibbie's is a racy and vigorous personality, an unflinching topic with the good guests of Yorkburg.

AMERICAN IN THE MAKING. By Lyman Abbott. 28 Pp. \$1.25. Yale University Press.

A series of lectures delivered at Yale

university. Mr. Abbott describes the conditions of life now prevailing in this country, with its heterogeneous population, and its lack of any common creed, or common tradition; and then, in succeeding chapters, points out what are the problems which lie before the makers of the America of the future. These he considers in four classes: as political, social, philanthropic and religious problems.

THE BUSINESS OF CONGRESS. By Samuel W. McCall. 201 Pp. \$1.50. Columbia University Press.

A course of lectures delivered at Columbia university, the chief purpose of which is to portray the important processes of legislation and to present the reasons underlying them.

A YEAR IN A COAL MINE. By Joseph Husband. 111 Pp. \$1.50. Houghton, Mifflin Company.

This book is the work of a young college man who actually underwent all of the thrilling experiences he describes. After graduating from Harvard Mr. Husband took a position in a coal mine in the middle west. In the course of the year that he was there he saw everything that can happen in a coal mine, including strikes, fires and explosions.

UNDER THE ROOF OF THE JUNGLE. By Charles Livingston Bull. 271 Pp. \$2. L. C. Page & Co.

The author gives the results of his natural history exploring in the wild and beautiful jungle regions, which spread in an unbroken sweep from the Gulf of Mexico to the southern limits of Brazil, and from the mouth of the Amazon to the Andes mountains. The rule of the jungle is war, constant war. Each animal and bird lives in constant fear, and most of them prey upon others. Mr. Bull's book, while strictly authentic, is as fascinating as fiction, and will prove most interesting to the general reader as well as to the animal lover.

FROM ROUGH RIDER TO PRESIDENT. By Max Kuminick. 228 Pp. \$1.50. A. C. McClurg & Co.

This book, by an eminent German scholar, is of peculiar interest as exhibiting President Roosevelt from the German point of view. Besides this, it presents Colonel Roosevelt's boyhood life and early official life in a detailed way.

THE YOUNG MAN ENTERING BUSINESS. By Orison Sweet Marden. 307 Pp. \$1. Thomas Y. Crowell & Co.

The author has tried to show the difference between "pretty good" and "excellent" often measures the difference between a mediocre career and success. The book is forceful and practical.

THE COMPLETE POEMS OF EDGAR ALLEN POE. Edited by J. H. Whitely. 227 Pp. Houghton, Mifflin Company.

A complete edition, containing several hitherto unpublished poems, a portrait of Poe which has never been reproduced, a new and definitive text based on the poet's own last revision of his work, and a memoir by the editor, grounded upon new information.

HOME VEGETABLE GARDENING. By F. P. Rockwell. 362 Pp. \$1. The John C. Winston Company.

The author of this work is a practical gardener, and from long experience realizes just what the layman wants to know. The information is presented in logical sequence in order that it may be used to the best advantage. The book also includes the growing of berries and fruit.

THE NEW HESPERIDES. By Joel Elias Spingarn. \$1. Sturgis & Walton company.

A collection of poems on varied themes, direct and simple in their human appeal.

MENTAL EFFICIENCY. By Arnold Bennett. 119 Pp. 75 cents. George H. Doran & Co.

In this little volume the author shows how the mind may be servant to the soul and he outlines what have proved for him the most helpful views of life.

HARPER'S CAMPING AND SCOUTING. By George Bird Grinnell and Dr. Eugene L. Swan. 28 Pp. \$1.75. Harper & Bros.

How to prepare for camp, choose a site, how to cook and lookout for yourself generally is one part of this big new book. Other chapters show the work of the organized camps. Boy scouting is fully covered for American boys, with lessons in woodcraft and scouting games. Mountain climbing and scavanning make another interesting section.
