MAJOR BELLE REYNOLDS HERE

Only Woman Officer of Civil War Visits in Omaha. WAS IN FAMOUS BATTLES. Commissioned by the Governor of Illinois, Major Reynolds Continues with Army Until Close of the War.

Major Reynolds has just returned from the fiftieth anniversary of the muster out of the Seventeenth Illinois Infantry, which was held at Joliet, Ill., and will leave Omaha the latter part of this week for her home in Santa Barbara, Cal. But thirty-five of her old comrades of the civil war were left to attend the muster.

City Hall Officers Fight Over Shares of Circus Tickets

Schneider and Butler Cannot Agree Upon Divisions of Spoils When Circus Comes to Town. The war that is on at the city hall every time a circus comes to town raged with unusual fierceness Tuesday morning. There is always a scramble to see how many of the officials, attaches and employees will get a share of the liberal allowance of circus tickets which is always on hand. Dick Schneider, home inspector, and Dan Butler, city clerk, both claim the right to distribute the spoils, and neither will give friends of the other a chance. It happened this time that the tickets were delivered to the city clerk. They were given out according to Butler to the city councilmen and to employees who reserved them. The friends of Schneider, however, and the elevator men, who bowed loudly in the corridor, and the heads of departments who thought they had "some rights," were all left out in the cold. Schneider, being a personal friend of an agent of the circus, issued some of his own cards with the mayor's O. K. on them and that appeased a few of the disappointed ones. The mayor, of course, received his individual quota from the advance men, but few of the other chiefs in the building received any piece of the pie. A few of them did not even know that they were being abused, but some were loud in their complaints.

Divorce Annulled, Allowing Woman to Inherit Estate

Wife Has Her Divorce Set Aside When Her Husband Dies and Leaves Property. Attorneys for Mrs. Leon Levy secured an order from Judge Kennedy in district court Tuesday annulling the decree of divorce from her husband granted to her the first of last month. A decree does not go into effect until sixty days after its signing and this time limit had not expired by quite twenty-eight days.
