WASHINGTON, July 14,-(Special Telegram.)-Representative Kinkaid, who has been away on leave of absence to attend to personal business, returned to the capital yesterday. On his return he found a letter from C. H. Cornell of Valentine requesting that he endeavor to gain permission of the War department to permit settlers about the Fort Niobrara military reservation to cut hay upon that reservation. It is represented that because of drouth the hay crop is short in the vicinity of Valentine and that upon the Fort Niebrara reservation there is much hay going to waste, which, it appears to settlers, they should be permitted to harevet. The reservation has been abandoned for military purposes and

is now in charge of a caretaker. Representative Kinkaid today took the matter up with General Oliver, acting secretary of war, in the absence of Secretary Stimson, who is in Panama, presented the case in person and submitted a written statement of the situation. Judge Kinkaid said after his interview with General Oliver that he felt reasonably confident that the settlers may be granted the necessary permission under reasonable conditions to be established by the War department.
