Fried Chicken a la Maryland. Joint a tender chicken as for Frisco. Wash and wipe perfectly dry. Dip each piece in beaten egg, then roll in salted and peppered cracker dust until it is thoroughly coated, set upon ice for an hour. Have plenty of clean dripping or other fat in a deep frying pan and bring slowly to the boiling point. Lay in the chicken carefully and fry on both sides to a fine brown. Do not put too many pieces in at a time, or the oil will not be done evenly. Fry long enough to make sure the thickest pieces are done all through.

invitation to moths. Have such things brushed free from dust and then cleaned and packed away. Camphor, moth balls, etc., keep moths away because they object to the odor, but if moths are already present the things named do not prevent their hatching out. A cold steamiron is better than a warm one. If moths have got into carpets they may be killed by sponging the carpets with benzine or gasoline, but first open all doors and windows so that there is a perfect circulation of air. Second, leave them open till every trace of the fluid has disappeared.

**Baby Basket.** When taking baby on a trip of any great length to have everything for comfort handy is necessary. To this end a Japanese straw telescope case may be arranged perfectly for the purpose. Line the lower basket with heavy gray linen, with pockets around the sides to hold all of the toilet articles—two rubber lined for the sponge and soap. A pin cushion of linen and a linen covered talcum completes the fittings.

**One Hour Wet Bread.** Three-fourths cupful of sugar, one egg, two cupfuls of milk, four cupfuls of sifted flour, four teaspoonfuls of the best baking powder, one cupful of oats. Let raise thirty minutes. Bake thirty minutes. Recipe must be followed as given.

## Some Hints on Hose

**T**HE popularity of pumps for women's wear and the vogue for short skirts are responsible for the fancy silk stockings of beaded and embroidered designs. Most women are rather proud of having their feet dressed well, and justly so, as nothing is more attractive than a trim looking foot, and the combination of pumps and beautiful hose works wonders in showing them off to the best advantage. The woman who is smartly dressed no longer thinks that her fine silk stockings with these lines of stockings are sufficient for any but the most ordinary wear. Wonderful patterns decorate the instep and meander up the sides in place of stockings.

Japanese silk stockings, which resemble satin, outlast pure silk ones, but if you really prefer silk hose you can buy those with lace soles. When the heels and soles of silk stockings have worn out buy gauze feet and attach them after cutting the foot of the silk stocking off at the ankle.

These can be worn with high shoes. Face the tops with narrow ribbon, so the garter class will not pull the threads. If a hole wears in the stocking foot place a piece of sheer silk inside and darn it in place with silk to match the hose.

Many women—perhaps the majority—wear their stockings as they come from the store. They should first be washed, not only for the sake of cleanliness, but because they will wear better. The washing will cause a slight shrinkage, which brings the threads together more completely. Soak them first in tepid water in which a little borax has been dissolved, then wash in tepid water and rinse in two or three waters before hanging them up to dry. Another reason why this washing should be done is because you do not know what hands have held the stocking before they came into your possession—whether they have always been in the most cleanly quarters or whether any injurious dye is present.
