Early Prospects of Northwest Wheat Will Not Be Fulfilled. LACK OF EARS IN IOWA CORN. Wheat Rules Nervous, but Slightly Lower Than Previous Day.

OMAHA, Aug. 2, 1911. The deterioration in the northwest, which has been sensational, while not entirely groundless, is considered far less highly colored. The spring wheat crop has been better than anticipated and the market is making the most of black rust reports and the lowering of early estimates.

Wheat ruled nervous but slightly lower than yesterday's close. Sentiment continues bullish on bad northwest crop news. Cash wheat was strong, 4c higher, and shipments were 43,000 bushels.

Primary corn receipts were 234,000 bushels and shipments were 115,000 bushels against receipts last year of 222,000 bushels and shipments of 625,000 bushels.

NEW YORK, Aug. 2.—On a much larger volume of trading the stock market today manifested a pronounced inclination to seek a lower level. Prices held fairly steady at the outset, but early in the session a considerable selling movement set in.

The heaviness of the list probably was traceable to a number of causes. Railroad and other executives have recently been preaching the gospel of caution and conservatism.

Another theory advanced in explanation of the market's heaviness is that the large amount of securities sold here through London and continental sources, while the market was fairly active here today.
