TO ALL WORK ON WARSHIPS

WASHINGTON, Aug. 11.-The eight-hour labor law will be extended in private ship yards further than ever before atof the Union Pacific tempted by the government, by contracts soon to be let for two battleships and four submarine torpedo boats. LONDON, Aug. 11.-Premier Asquith's government, which claims to represent the democarcy of Great Britain last night enforced its will upon the peerage by the narrow vote of 131 to 114. By this vote the House of Lords decided to accept what the liberals contend is the will of the people and adopted Viscount Morley's motion not to insist upon the lords' amendments to the parliamentary bill, which practically limits the power of the House of Lords to a two-year suspensory vote and vastly increases the prerogatives of the
