ST. JOSEPH TAKES HARD FOUGHT ONE

Timely Hitting Gives Visitors First of the Series with the Rourkees.

GAME HOLDS EVEN TO THE END

Crowd Thinks Rourkees Have it Tied Up Safely.

DEMOTT IS REPLACED BY HALL

Big Leaguer Weakens in Sixth and is Taken Out.

CHELLETTE HAS STAYING POWER

Former Texas Wins Pitchers' Battle Through Endurance and Crowd is Well Pleased with Closeness of the Struggle.

Timely hitting by the Joses with the assistance of the Rourkees' errors gave the visitors the first game of the series, just at the time when the fans had believed the game safely tucked away by the home sluggers. When Demott weakened in the sixth and was batted for the box, the Joses took the jump and went one run to the good, which lead the Rourkees failed to overcome and the boys from Missouri trotted off the field with a 2 to 1 game.

Kneaves Throws Wild.

But for one error made by Kneaves in the sixth inning, the game might have gone until darkness. Kneaves, in his hurry to pull off a double play threw the ball wild to Kane, allowing Meinke to race all the way from second base to the home plate. It was a simple run of the game and the one which could not be blamed much for it throw as he had to dodge the runner coming towards him and still get the ball away in time to catch the man at first. Thomsen made the second error by balking on anything in the first two innings, but in the third, the team runs came in. Chellette sent a high one to the center garden, and after much judging, Tommie got the ball in his mitt only to have it bounce out.

St. Joseph Begins Early.

St. Joseph made the two first runs of the opening round, due mostly to Demott's inability to get a line on the pitcher. He passed the first man up, Kelly, and then struck out Kelly. He then threw the ball away, allowing Kelly to get to third. Zwilling, after getting three wild ones, stepped in and shot the leather to left for the first time, and scored Kelly. Borton was easy on the pitcher, and the holden, the new catcher, acquired by the Holland, and who played the center garden position yesterday, broke up the inning with a double to left, sending Zwilling across the pan for the second tally.

Later in the morning dozens of the visitors were piled into automobiles, to be carried out to the Country club where they will practice, get their lockers for the week, and prepare for the opening of the tourney Monday morning.
