OMAHA LOSSES CLOSE BATTLE

During Eight Innings Pueblo Made Bourke Hunt for the Ball.

COLTS TAKE SPURT IN NINTH

Home Team Makes Two Costly Errors in First Inning, Sending Two of Visiting Members Across Home Plate.

Omaha's inability to hit at opportune times lost the second battle of the series with Pueblo. Both Robinson and Faber, Bourke and Pueblo were in fine form and waged a fierce battle. The orphans, however, took a lead in the first and won the game, 4 to 2.

For eight innings Faber kept the Bourkes hunting for the ball. Only three hits were speared off his delivery in the eight innings, but in the ninth he was found for a triple, gave a pass and then found for a homer which brought the score up to within one of the Pueblo score.

Omaha made a try to deadlock or pass the opponents' score. Kane pushed a high one to Schmid, who made an easy catch of it. Williams, the big Bourke left fielder, drew three balls and two strikes and then landed on the horsefield for three bags.
