PACERS BREAK RECORD AGAIN

Independence Boy Defeats Earl, Jr.,

in Terrific Battle.

Roster-Columbus Race for Green Trot. ters Proves Almost Walkaway for Tommy Murphy's Good

COLUMBUS, O., Aug. 18.-The most impressive features of the second day of the International Breeders' race meeting yesterday were the enormus crowds and breaking of the world's record of three heats in a race in the King stake of \$3,000 for 3:04 pacers. The Hoster-Columbus brewers' stake of \$10,000 for 2:15 trotters was overshadowed by the King stake. It was the first on the card and brought together again Earl, Jr., and Independence Boy. Earl, Jr., was made the favorite, but

Independence Boy was heavny played as he is a Columbus horse. The field was almost neglected. In the first heat Independence Boy set the pace into the stretch, where he was challenged by Earl, Jr., and the pair fought it out to the wire, Independence Boy pushing his nose in front in the last two strides. In the second heat Major Mallow led until

the stretch was reached, and then Independence Boy and Earl, Jr., again shot to the front and passed under the wire so close together that it required the verdict of the judges to decide that Independence Boy had won again.

In the third heat Independence Boy went to the front on the upper turn, gaining a long lead, which Earl, Jr. could not overcome, giving the Columbus horse a victory in straight heats.

The time made in this race was phenomenal. The first heat was the slowest, 2:02%; the second was a second faster and the third was in 2:02 flat. The average time was one-sixth of a second slower than game for a week. Raiston was hit by a 2:02, and this is the world's record for pitched ball and knocked senseless, while three heats in a race, beating the average of the three heats paced by these horses at Cleveland last week by a quarter of a second.
