GRAIN AND PRODUCE MARKET

Conflicting Influences in Wheat Bring Variation of Views.

CORN MARKET ACTION IS FIRM

Wheat Hales Stronger and Higher—News is Bullish on Harvesting in Northwest—Frost Predicted in Canadian Provinces.

OMAHA, Aug. 21, 1911. Views among the wheat traders are well mixed, which is not surprising considering the conflicting influences.

With the falling off in the winter wheat movement, cash wheat values have advanced. There still remains a possibility of frost damage to the late Canadian crop, while on the other hand recent favorable reports on harvesting and heavy crop movement abroad are against any decided advance. For the time being the market will likely turn to the good or bad harvesting in the spring wheat belt.

The action in the corn market is firm, support coming from professional speculators, but a little credit has been given as this support is withdrawn. Small stocks and very light country offerings and an established shortage in the year's crop, are the market features.

Wheat ruled strong and higher today. News was bullish on harvesting in the northwest and frost was predicted in the Canadian provinces.

Corn ruled narrow and dull. Speculative trade was not active and cash corn ruled flat to 1/2 lower.

Primary wheat receipts were 1,200,000 bushels against last year's 1,100,000 bushels and shipments of 750,000 bushels.

Primary corn receipts were 400,000 bushels and shipments were 320,000 bushels against last year's 400,000 bushels and shipments of 320,000 bushels.

Clearances were 3,000 bushels of corn, 30 bushels of oats and wheat and flour equal to 200,000 bushels.

Liverpool closed 1/2 lower on wheat and 1/4 lower on corn.
